#### BY COUNCILOR CALDWELL:

- 10. Amend Ord. #2, (01/10/2022), "Appropriate Funds From the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 in an amount not to exceed \$1,300,000, on behalf of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Youth Programs, to repair and restore the pool and the water feature at Burnet Park". Amend to allocate the remaining balance of \$251,170 to be used for the saltwater conversion at Onondaga, Kirk and Shciller Parks outdoor pools. The Burnet Park project is complete.

A LOCAL LAW OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE TO AMEND THE ANNUAL BUDGET OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE FOR THE YEAR 2022/2023 TO REFLECT THE SALARY INCREASES PURSUANT TO A CONTRACT NEGOTIATED BETWEEN THE CITY OF SYRACUSE AND THE POLICE BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION (PBA)

BE IT ENACTED, by the Common Council of the City of Syracuse, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_\_ approving the negotiated contract between the Police Benevolent Association (PBA) and the City of Syracuse, effective January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2027, which includes wage and benefit increases for employees covered by said contract and which increases are retroactively effective as of January 1, 2023, as set forth in the labor contract on file with the City Clerk, and subject to the approval of the Mayor who shall have the power and authority to change and increase the salary, compensation and benefits of those employees covered by the aforementioned contract, said salary, compensation and benefits shall be paid from the Treasury of the City of Syracuse in the fiscal year 2022/2023 notwithstanding the fact that any such salary, compensation and benefits shall previously have been fixed or provided for in the budgets of said City for such fiscal year 2022/2023, provided, however, that any such increases shall be within the total amount contained in the budgets for such fiscal year and within such additional amounts as may be legally available therefor. The changes herein authorized shall be effective as of January 1, 2023.

Section 2. The annual budgets of the City of Syracuse for the year 2022/2023 be and the same are hereby amended to reflect the increases and changes for employees covered by the aforementioned contract.

Section 3. Article 2-C, Section 25 of the General City Law, insofar as it restricts or is inconsistent with the provisions of Section 1 through 2 of this Local Law is hereby superseded.

Section 4. This local law shall take effect immediately.

Dear Ms. McBride,

Please place on the agenda for the next meeting of the Common Council, a request for legislation to authorize a labor agreement between the City of Syracuse and the Police Benevolent Association (PBA). #### **MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT**

### 2023-2027 Collective Bargaining Agreement

This memorandum of agreement is entered into on January 24, 2023 ("Agreement"), between the City of Syracuse ("City") and the Syracuse Police Benevolent Association, Inc. ("PBA").

WHEREAS, the City and PBA are parties to a collective bargaining agreement for the period 1998-1999 ("1998-99 CBA"); and

WHEREAS, since expiration of the 1998-99 CBA, the City and the PBA have been parties to a series of interest arbitration awards ("IA Award(s)") and memoranda of agreement ("MOA(s)"), all of which concern the terms and conditions of employment for PBA bargaining unit members for the period 2000 through 2022; and

WHEREAS, the parties met on September 16 and 28, October 20, November 2 and 30, and December 9 and 29, 2022, and January 6, 2023, and engaged in collective negotiations to reach an agreement that covers the period from December 31, 2022 forward; and

WHEREAS, the parties have reached this Agreement, subject to ratification by the membership of the PBA and by the Syracuse Common Council; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree to amend all affected articles of the 1998-99 CBA and provisions of the IA Awards and MOAs as follows:

#### 1. TERM OF AGREEMENT

The term of this Agreement is January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2027.

#### 2. GENERAL WAGE INCREASE

Wages shall be increased as follows:

- a. Effective January 1, 2023: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- b. Effective July 1, 2023: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- c. Effective January 1, 2024: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- d. Effective July 1, 2024: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- e. Effective January 1, 2025: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- f. Effective July 1, 2025: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- g. Effective January 1, 2026: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- h. Effective July 1, 2026: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- i. Effective January 1, 2027: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- j. Effective July 1, 2027: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).

#### 3. SCHEDULE

Article 24, Miscellaneous Provisions, will be amended to provide for a 10-hour workday schedule, as follows:

a. The City will implement the new schedules within 120 days of the date of the Agreement. If, due to logistical reasons, implementation cannot be accomplished by that date, the City will seek the PBA's consent to extend the implementation date for up to 60 additional days, which consent will not be unreasonably withheld. The City will provide the PBA with 30-days notice prior to the implementation of, any modifications to, or the abandonment of, the 10-hour workday schedule.

- b. The City will provide affected members with 14-days notice prior to the implementation of, any modifications to, or the abandonment of, the 10-hour workday schedule.
- c. For purposes of initial implementation, following a jointly agreed-upon bidding process, members will be assigned to 10-hour workday schedules in accordance with their unit assignment.
- i. Patrol: Patrol members will follow a pattern of four (4) 10-hour days on duty, followed by three (3) days off duty, followed by four (4) 10-hour days on duty, followed by four (4) days off duty; this pattern will then repeat. The start and end times of the watches will be established, and may be adjusted periodically, by the City based upon its departmental needs and determination of public safety service needs and requirements.
- pattern of four (4) 10-hour days on duty, followed by three (3) days off duty; or a traditional schedule of five (5) 8-hour days on duty followed by two days off, as currently maintained. The start and end times of the shifts, as well as the 4-3 or 5-2 designation, may be adjusted periodically by the City based upon its departmental needs and determination of public safety service needs and requirements.
- d. The existing 5-2 (8-hour workday) bonus wheel will also apply to the new 4-3 (10-hour workday) schedule.
- e. In the event the City determines that the 10-hour Patrol workday schedules outlined above do not meet the department's operational needs, the City may revert to the work schedules in effect prior to the implementation of the 10-hour workday schedules.

The City will make any determination to revert based upon data and information regarding overtime utilization, "ordering-in" usage, the number calls for service and corresponding wait-times, or other such operational factors. Additionally, if a staffing study of the Police Department is conducted as a result of the pending Request for Proposals from the City of Syracuse Common Council, the results of that study will be utilized as an additional factor in determining the success of the schedule. In making any determination to revert, the City agrees to consider only the foregoing operational factors and staffing study results. Prior to making any final determination to revert, the City will consult with the PBA. The 30-day notice period set forth in subparagraph (a) above will commence upon completion of that consultation.

f. Nothing in this Agreement shall affect the extant management rights of the City to determine or change the number of members required to be on duty during any watch or work schedule.

#### 4. SICK LEAVE INCENTIVE

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave (including Section 19.4), will be amended and the existing sick leave incentive program set forth in the 2011-2015 IA Award will be eliminated and replaced by the following:

- a. Sick leave instances and incentives accrued during the period of January 1, 2023 to the date of mutual ratification shall be waived by both parties and not considered in the sick leave incentive sell-back for calendar year 2023.
- b. Sick leave will be analyzed and paid out on an annual basis rather than a quarterly review. Payouts will be made pursuant to the chart below and will continue to be

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paid under the current schedule. Eligible sick leave hours will be paid out at the member's individual rate up to cap listed below:

Annual Usage	<u>Sell Back</u>
0 instances	up to 80 hours
1 instance	up to 50 hours
2 instances	up to 30 hours

An "instance" means the use of any sick time on a single or any consecutive work day(s).

- c. To be eligible for sell-back, the member must meet the following criteria:
- i. The member must be active with the Syracuse Police Department for at least one year or have transferred from a lateral agency prior to March 31st of the calendar year under review.
- ii. The member must have two or fewer instances of sick time, which results in a different tiered sell-back.
- iii. The member may sell back time earned only during that calendar year. Time in "bank" is not eligible for sell-back under the incentive program.
- iv. A member must have the time available for use to sell it back (a member cannot sell back time the member does not have).
- v. A member must be current at the time of the sell-back and annual payout in order to qualify for sell-back.
- vi. A member may sell back less than the maximum number of eligible hours, provided the member makes timely notification to Syracuse Police Department Human Resources Department, Attn: Administrative Director. Absent such notification, all eligible hours will be included in the sell-back.

#### 5. SICK LEAVE

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave, will be amended to provide the following:

- a. The schedule for annual accrual of sick leave will be amended as follows:
  - i. Up to the first of January following date of hire

10 hours per full month of service

ii. From 1 through 9 years of service 160 hours

iii. From 10 or more years of service 208 hours

- b. If a member calls in sick, the member will be ineligible for any voluntary overtime for a period of forty-eight (48) hours. This provision does not apply to Family Sick Leave. The member may apply to the Chief's Office for a waiver, which may be granted in the Chief's, or their designee's, discretion.
- c. If a member submitted a time-off request that was denied, and then utilized sick leave for the date(s) previously denied, the member must provide a note from the member's physician or other qualified treatment provider before returning to work or may face disciplinary action, including but not limited to suspension or termination.
- d. If a member has more than two instances of sick leave within a rolling sixmonth period, a member must provide a note from the member's physician or other qualified treatment provider before returning to work.
- e. A member who has utilized sick leave for three (3) or more consecutive days must provide a note from the member's physician or other qualified treatment provider before returning to work.
  - f. Members must utilize sick time on a last-earned, first-used basis.

#### 6. FAMILY MEDICAL LEAVE (Y DAYS)

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave, and the 2011-2015 MOA will be amended to provide that:

- a. Up to thirty (30) hours may be used from sick leave accruals for family medical leave; and
  - b. Family medical leave may be used in hourly increments.

#### 7. PARENTAL LEAVE

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave, will be amended to provide that up to twenty (20) sick days may be utilized for parental leave. Parental leave will be deducted from the member's accrued sick leave (regardless of when accrued); its usage will not count as an "instance" for purposes of determining sick leave incentive eligibility. Members must abide by the City of Syracuse Police Department Parental Leave policy regarding requests for conversion of time and utilization.

### 8. PAID LEAVE/ACCRUAL IN HOURS

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 7, Vacation & Holidays, and any other affected provisions will be amended to provide that all time accrued (furlough, bonus, personal, sick, etc.) will be converted from days to hours (at the rate of one (1) day equals eight (8) hours) and thereafter be applied based on the actual number of hours used by the member. Holiday pay will also be converted at the rate of one (1) day equals eight (8) hours and payout will remain on the current schedule. With the exception of sick leave, leave hours may be used in one-hour increments. Sick leave may be used only in full day increments.

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#### 9. CALL-IN TIME

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 8, Overtime, will be amended, as follows:

8.5 The employer shall pay a minimum of four hours' work at overtime rates when an off-duty member is called in to work ordered overtime for a period of time which is not contiguous to that employee's regular tour of duty. Off-duty oral or written communications that last less than thirty minutes, and do not involve a physical response by the member, shall not qualify as a "call in" and are not eligible for overtime compensation.

#### 10. UNIFORM ALLOWANCE

Effective January 1, 2024, Article 6, Uniforms, and the 2006-07 MOA, will be amended to replace the existing voucher portion of the uniform allowance with a flat \$750 allowance (taxable). Payment of the allowance will be made by January 31 of each year.

#### 11. RANK DIFFERENTIAL

Effective April 1, 2023, Article 5, Salary and Wages, and Appendix A, and the 2018-19 IA

Award concerning rank differentials will be amended to eliminate the first step (less than 3 years in the position) for each officer rank, such that a single salary applies to each officer rank.

#### 12. **207-c POLICY**

The parties will hold a separate negotiation over changes to the existing 207-c policy.

#### 13. ACCIDENT REVIEW COMMITTEE

The parties will hold a separate negotiation over changes to the existing ARC rules.

#### 14. RETROACTIVE PAYMENTS

Compensation affected by the terms of this Agreement shall be retroactive to the indicated effective dates. Retroactive payments shall be paid to all members or former members who were active during the period covered by this Agreement, including on a pro rata basis to those who were active for less than the full period. All retroactive payments shall be made within sixty (60) days of the later of the parties' respective ratifications of this Agreement.

### 15. OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS REMAIN IN EFFECT

Except as modified herein, all other terms and conditions contained in the 1998-99 CBA and subsequent IA Awards and MOAs covering the period 2000 through 2022 shall remain in effect.

Please prepare legislation for the next regularly scheduled Common Council meeting to amend ordinance 424-2022, in order to increase annual contract amount, to reflect actual services being provided to Veterinary Medical Center of CNY (VMC). The original ordinance was for VMC to "provide animal services, which includes cleansing and disinfecting wounds and abrasions; relieving pain through medication and analgesics; intravenous fluids, if needed; and euthanasia of severely injured and/or suffering animals with unknown owners and necropsy in extreme cases."

Veterinary Medical Center of CNY has been providing dependable and satisfactory service over a number of years and due to the fact that they have been the sole source for providing evening emergency care for animals.

Terms of this current contract will be for one year (July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023), with one year extension remaining (July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024).

### **MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT**

## 2023-2027 Collective Bargaining Agreement

This memorandum of agreement is entered into on January 24, 2023 ("Agreement"), between the City of Syracuse ("City") and the Syracuse Police Benevolent Association, Inc. ("PBA").

WHEREAS, the City and PBA are parties to a collective bargaining agreement for the period 1998-1999 ("1998-99 CBA"); and

WHEREAS, since expiration of the 1998-99 CBA, the City and the PBA have been parties to a series of interest arbitration awards ("IA Award(s)") and memoranda of agreement ("MOA(s)"), all of which concern the terms and conditions of employment for PBA bargaining unit members for the period 2000 through 2022; and

WHEREAS, the parties met on September 16 and 28, October 20, November 2 and 30, and December 9 and 29, 2022, and January 6, 2023, and engaged in collective negotiations to reach an agreement that covers the period from December 31, 2022 forward; and

WHEREAS, the parties have reached this Agreement, subject to ratification by the membership of the PBA and by the Syracuse Common Council; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree to amend all affected articles of the 1998-99 CBA and provisions of the IA Awards and MOAs as follows:

#### 1. TERM OF AGREEMENT

The term of this Agreement is January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2027.

## 2. GENERAL WAGE INCREASE

Wages shall be increased as follows:

- a. Effective January 1, 2023: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- b. Effective July 1, 2023: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- c. Effective January 1, 2024: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- d. Effective July 1, 2024: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- e. Effective January 1, 2025: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- f. Effective July 1, 2025: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- g. Effective January 1, 2026: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- h. Effective July 1, 2026: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- i. Effective January 1, 2027: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).
- j. Effective July 1, 2027: One and three-quarter percent (1.75%).

### 3. SCHEDULE

Article 24, Miscellaneous Provisions, will be amended to provide for a 10-hour workday schedule, as follows:

a. The City will implement the new schedules within 120 days of the date of the Agreement. If, due to logistical reasons, implementation cannot be accomplished by that date, the City will seek the PBA's consent to extend the implementation date for up to 60 additional days, which consent will not be unreasonably withheld. The City will provide the PBA with 30-days notice prior to the implementation of, any modifications to, or the abandonment of, the 10-hour workday schedule.

- b. The City will provide affected members with 14-days notice prior to the implementation of, any modifications to, or the abandonment of, the 10-hour workday schedule.
- c. For purposes of initial implementation, following a jointly agreed-upon bidding process, members will be assigned to 10-hour workday schedules in accordance with their unit assignment.
- i. Patrol: Patrol members will follow a pattern of four (4) 10-hour days on duty, followed by three (3) days off duty, followed by four (4) 10-hour days on duty, followed by four (4) days off duty; this pattern will then repeat. The start and end times of the watches will be established, and may be adjusted periodically, by the City based upon its departmental needs and determination of public safety service needs and requirements.
- pattern of four (4) 10-hour days on duty, followed by three (3) days off duty; *or* a traditional schedule of five (5) 8-hour days on duty followed by two days off, as currently maintained. The start and end times of the shifts, as well as the 4-3 or 5-2 designation, may be adjusted periodically by the City based upon its departmental needs and determination of public safety service needs and requirements.
- d. The existing 5-2 (8-hour workday) bonus wheel will also apply to the new 4-3 (10-hour workday) schedule.
- e. In the event the City determines that the 10-hour Patrol workday schedules outlined above do not meet the department's operational needs, the City may revert to the work schedules in effect prior to the implementation of the 10-hour workday schedules.

The City will make any determination to revert based upon data and information regarding overtime utilization, "ordering-in" usage, the number calls for service and corresponding wait-times, or other such operational factors. Additionally, if a staffing study of the Police Department is conducted as a result of the pending Request for Proposals from the City of Syracuse Common Council, the results of that study will be utilized as an additional factor in determining the success of the schedule. In making any determination to revert, the City agrees to consider only the foregoing operational factors and staffing study results. Prior to making any final determination to revert, the City will consult with the PBA. The 30-day notice period set forth in subparagraph (a) above will commence upon completion of that consultation.

f. Nothing in this Agreement shall affect the extant management rights of the City to determine or change the number of members required to be on duty during any watch or work schedule.

### 4. SICK LEAVE INCENTIVE

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave (including Section 19.4), will be amended and the existing sick leave incentive program set forth in the 2011-2015 IA Award will be eliminated and replaced by the following:

- a. Sick leave instances and incentives accrued during the period of January 1, 2023 to the date of mutual ratification shall be waived by both parties and not considered in the sick leave incentive sell-back for calendar year 2023.
- b. Sick leave will be analyzed and paid out on an annual basis rather than a quarterly review. Payouts will be made pursuant to the chart below and will continue to be

paid under the current schedule. Eligible sick leave hours will be paid out at the member's individual rate up to cap listed below:

Annual Usage	<u>Sell Back</u>
0 instances	up to 80 hours
1 instance	up to 50 hours
2 instances	up to 30 hours

An "instance" means the use of any sick time on a single or any consecutive work day(s).

- c. To be eligible for sell-back, the member must meet the following criteria:
- i. The member must be active with the Syracuse Police Department for at least one year or have transferred from a lateral agency prior to March 31st of the calendar year under review.
- ii. The member must have two or fewer instances of sick time, which results in a different tiered sell-back.
- iii. The member may sell back time earned only during that calendar year. Time in "bank" is not eligible for sell-back under the incentive program.
- iv. A member must have the time available for use to sell it back (a member cannot sell back time the member does not have).
- v. A member must be current at the time of the sell-back and annual payout in order to qualify for sell-back.
- eligible hours, provided the member makes timely notification to Syracuse Police Department
  Human Resources Department, Attn: Administrative Director. Absent such notification, all
  eligible hours will be included in the sell-back.

## 5. SICK LEAVE

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave, will be amended to provide the following:

- a. The schedule for annual accrual of sick leave will be amended as follows:
  - Up to the first of January following date of hire

10 hours per full month of service

- ii. From 1 through 9 years of service 160 hours
- iii. From 10 or more years of service 208 hours
- b. If a member calls in sick, the member will be ineligible for any voluntary overtime for a period of forty-eight (48) hours. This provision does not apply to Family Sick Leave. The member may apply to the Chief's Office for a waiver, which may be granted in the Chief's, or their designee's, discretion.
- c. If a member submitted a time-off request that was denied, and then utilized sick leave for the date(s) previously denied, the member must provide a note from the member's physician or other qualified treatment provider before returning to work or may face disciplinary action, including but not limited to suspension or termination.
- d. If a member has more than two instances of sick leave within a rolling six-month period, a member must provide a note from the member's physician or other qualified treatment provider before returning to work.
- e. A member who has utilized sick leave for three (3) or more consecutive days must provide a note from the member's physician or other qualified treatment provider before returning to work.
  - f. Members must utilize sick time on a last-earned, first-used basis.

## 6. FAMILY MEDICAL LEAVE (Y DAYS)

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave, and the 2011-2015 MOA will be amended to provide that:

- a. Up to thirty (30) hours may be used from sick leave accruals for family medical leave; and
  - b. Family medical leave may be used in hourly increments.

### 7. PARENTAL LEAVE

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 19, Non-Job Related Sick Leave, will be amended to provide that up to twenty (20) sick days may be utilized for parental leave.

Parental leave will be deducted from the member's accrued sick leave (regardless of when accrued); its usage will not count as an "instance" for purposes of determining sick leave incentive eligibility. Members must abide by the City of Syracuse Police Department Parental Leave policy regarding requests for conversion of time and utilization.

## 8. PAID LEAVE/ACCRUAL IN HOURS

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 7, Vacation & Holidays, and any other affected provisions will be amended to provide that all time accrued (furlough, bonus, personal, sick, etc.) will be converted from days to hours (at the rate of one (1) day equals eight (8) hours) and thereafter be applied based on the actual number of hours used by the member. Holiday pay will also be converted at the rate of one (1) day equals eight (8) hours and payout will remain on the current schedule. With the exception of sick leave, leave hours may be used in one-hour increments. Sick leave may be used only in full day increments.

### 9. CALL-IN TIME

Effective upon mutual ratification, Article 8, Overtime, will be amended, as follows:

8.5 The employer shall pay a minimum of four hours' work at overtime rates when an off-duty member is called in to work ordered overtime for a period of time which is not contiguous to that employee's regular tour of duty. Off-duty oral or written communications that last less than thirty minutes, and do not involve a physical response by the member, shall not qualify as a "call in" and are not eligible for overtime compensation.

## 10. UNIFORM ALLOWANCE

Effective January 1, 2024, Article 6, Uniforms, and the 2006-07 MOA, will be amended to replace the existing voucher portion of the uniform allowance with a flat \$750 allowance (taxable). Payment of the allowance will be made by January 31 of each year.

### 11. RANK DIFFERENTIAL

Effective April 1, 2023, Article 5, Salary and Wages, and Appendix A, and the 2018-19 IA

Award concerning rank differentials will be amended to eliminate the first step (less than 3 years in the position) for each officer rank, such that a single salary applies to each officer rank.

### 12. **207-c POLICY**

The parties will hold a separate negotiation over changes to the existing 207-c policy.

### 13. ACCIDENT REVIEW COMMITTEE

The parties will hold a separate negotiation over changes to the existing ARC rules.

## 14. RETROACTIVE PAYMENTS

Compensation affected by the terms of this Agreement shall be retroactive to the indicated effective dates. Retroactive payments shall be paid to all members or former members who were active during the period covered by this Agreement, including on a pro rata basis to those who were active for less than the full period. All retroactive payments shall be made within sixty (60) days of the later of the parties' respective ratifications of this Agreement.

## 15. OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS REMAIN IN EFFECT

Except as modified herein, all other terms and conditions contained in the 1998-99 CBA and subsequent IA Awards and MOAs covering the period 2000 through 2022 shall remain in effect.

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF SYRACUSE TO ACT AS LEAD AGENCY PURSUANT TO THE NEW YORK STATE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY REVIEW ACT (SEQRA) TO EVALUATE THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT OF THE AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 14 OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES RELATIVE TO THE CONVERSION OF SOLID WASTE COLLECTION TO CITY ISSUED CONTAINERS

WHEREAS, the City is considering amendments to Chapter 14 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse relative to converting solid waste collection in the City to the use of City issued waste containers (the "Project") to protect the public health and welfare; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York, as amended, and the regulations of the Department of Environmental Conservation of the State of New York promulgated thereunder (collectively, "SEQRA"), the City is required to make a determination with respect to the environmental impact of any "action" (as defined by SEQRA) to be taken by the City, and the conversion to City required containers for solid waste collection constitutes such an action (the "Action"); NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, that the City hereby designates itself as lead agency under SEQRA for purposes of the amending Chapter 14 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse (the "Project") relative to requiring City issued containers for solid waste collection; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the City, acting through its Department of Public Works, shall conduct an environmental review of the Project in accordance with SEQRA and notify any involved or interested agencies.

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO ADOPT A NEGATIVE DECLARATION PURSUANT TO SEQRA FOR THE AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 14 OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE RELATIVE TO THE CONVERSION OF SOLID WASTE COLLECTION TO THE USE OF CITY ISSUED CONTAINERS

WHEREAS, the City of Syracuse, Department of Public Works (the "DPW") is requesting amendments to Chapter 14 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse to convert DPW's solid waste collection in the City to the use of City issued containers (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, as amended, the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (the "SEQR Act") and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto by the Department of Environmental Conservation of the State of New York, being 6 NYCRR Part 617, as amended (the "Regulations"), the City of Syracuse (the "City") desires to comply with the SEQR Act and the Regulations with respect to the Project; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of this objective, the DPW prepared a Short Environmental Assessment Form ("SEAF") for the Project (a copy of the SEAF is attached hereto as Appendix "A"); and

WHEREAS, the City has determined to conduct an uncoordinated review of the Project, and therefore, will proceed as if it were the only "involved agency" (as the quoted term is defined in the Regulations); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Regulations, the City has considered the significance of the potential environmental impacts of the Project by (a) using the criteria specified in Section 617.7 of the Regulations, and (b) examining the SEAF for the Project, together with other available

supporting information, to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern, and (c) thoroughly analyzing the identified areas of relevant environmental concern; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, that, subject to the approval of the Mayor, this Common Council authorizes the following findings and determinations:

Based upon an examination of the SEAF and other available supporting information, and considering both the magnitude and importance of each relevant area of environmental concern, and based further upon the City's knowledge of the area surrounding the Project and such further investigation of the Project and its potential environmental impact as the City has deemed appropriate, the City makes the following findings and determinations:

- 1. The Project is described on Appendix "A"; and
- 2. The Project constitutes a "Unlisted Action" (as the quoted term is defined in the Regulations); and
- 3. No significant adverse environmental impacts are noted in the SEAF for the Project and none are known to the City. Therefore, the City hereby determines that the Project will not have a significant adverse environmental impact, and the City will not require the preparation of an environmental impact statement with respect to the Project.

; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that as a consequence of such determination and in compliance with the requirements of the SEQR Act and the Regulations, the City directs the Commissioner of DPW to prepare and file a Negative Declaration; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this Ordinance shall take effect immediately.





GENERAL ORDINANCE AMENDING
CHAPTER 14 OF THE REVISED GENERAL
ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE,
AS AMENDED, ENTITLED "HEALTH AND

TO BE ENTITLED "CITY OF SYRACUSE

PROGRAM FOR UPDATING THE CITY'S
SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING
COLLECTION SYSTEM FOR HOUSEHOLD
WASTE GENERATORS"

BE IT ORDAINED, that Chapter 14 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse, as amended, is hereby amended to add a new Article 6 to be entitled "City of Syracuse Department of Public Works Program for Updating the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators" which shall read as follows:

#### Chapter 14. Health and Sanitation

Article 6. City of Syracuse Department of Public Works Program for Updating the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators

#### Section 14-65. Title

This Article shall be known as the "City of Syracuse Department of Public Works Program for Updating the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators".

#### Section 14-66. Definitions

For purposes of this Article the definitions shall be the same as those listed in Section 14-14 of this Chapter except for the following terms which for the purposes of this Article shall be defined as follows:

City Issued Regulation Container shall be defined as a 96-gallon wheeled cart owned by the City and issued by the City to residential property owners or their representatives in the City of Syracuse for the sole purpose of storage, collection and disposal of source separated solid waste.

Commissioner shall be defined as the Commissioner of the Department of Public Works.

Corporation Counsel shall be defined as the Corporation Counsel of the City of Syracuse.

Route(s) shall be defined as a route or routes selected by the Commissioner on a rolling basis to participate in the Program to update the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators.

#### Section 14-67. Purpose

The purpose of this Article is to authorize the Commissioner to establish a Program for updating the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators.

## Section 14-68. Program to Update the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators

The Commissioner is hereby authorized to establish a Program for updating the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators.

- (a) Pursuant to this Ordinance the Department of Public Works will convert its Solid Waste Collection System for Household Waste Generators from the current system of using Regulation Containers owned and supplied by individual Household Waste Generators to a new system of using City Issued Regulation Containers. This Program will initially focus only on the Solid Waste that is not classified as Recyclable, with the intention to convert to a similar system for the collection of recyclables at a later date.
- (b) The Commissioner shall be responsible for the creation of a plan to coordinate the distribution of City Issued Regulation Containers to Household Waste Generators in the City of Syracuse.
- (c) The Commissioner will be responsible for designating the Routes for this Program. The Routes selected by the Commissioner shall be reflective of conditions across the City of Syracuse in order to collect data that will help determine how to successfully complete a City-wide conversion to City Issued Regulation Containers. Once the Program is underway the Commissioner shall determine any changes that need to be made to the initial list of designated Routes and when additional Routes will be added to the Program. The Initial Routes selected by the Commissioner shall cover various collection days in order to represent the City's normal waste collection schedule.
- (d) The Department of Public Works, pursuant to the necessary authorizations from the Mayor and the Common Council, has purchased an initial supply of City Issued Regulations Containers. As the Routes are designated by the Commissioner, the Department of Public Works will deliver a City Issued Regulation Container to Eligible Household Waste Generators on the designated Route. The selection of Routes and distribution of the City Issued Regulation Containers will be done in Phases until the Program has become City-wide.

- (e) The number of City Issued Regulation Containers provided for use by a property classified as a Household Waste Generator shall be as follows:
  - Properties containing one (1) to four (4) Units, shall be issued one (1) individual City Issued Regulation Containers per unit.
  - Properties containing five (5) to ten (10) Units shall be issued a total of four (4) City Issued Regulation Containers that shall be shared by all residents of the property.
  - If a Property with five (5) to ten (10) units is unable to meet the requirements for the disposal of household waste with the four (4) City Issued Regulation Containers, then the Property Owner must arrange for private collection services as outlined for commercial waste generators in Section 14-19 of Article 2 of this Chapter.
- (f) For areas of the City that have been determined by the Commissioner to be topographically unsuitable for the use of the City Issued Regulation Containers, the Household Waste Generators will continue to use their own Regulation Containers in accordance with the requirements of Article 2 of this Chapter.
- (g) Property owners and/or their authorized representatives for non-owner occupied properties will receive notice from the Commissioner of the designation of their neighborhood as a Route participating in the program. Such notice will also provide information regarding the delivery of the City Issued Container and the date that the property owner or tenants of the residential property shall be required to cease using their current Regulation Container and begin to use the City Issued Regulation Container. The Notice will provide information on the specifics of the Program and provide contact information for questions or concerns. Individuals who require special accommodations should contact the Department of Public Works as soon as possible after receipt of the Notice.
- (h) The following Operating Rules and Regulations shall apply to the Program:
  - (1) Household Waste shall be collected every seventh day in accordance with the assigned schedule for the residential neighborhood. The pickup day shall be set by the Department of Public Works. Pickup will be conducted by the Department of Public Works. Unless otherwise determined by the Commissioner, the Program shall follow the City's normal one day delay pickup schedule for the following holidays: Christmas, New Year's Day, Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Birthday; Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Thanksgiving Day.
  - (2) The City will provide the appropriate number of City Issued Regulation Containers for the Eligible Households located on one of the Routes participating in the Program, in accordance with subsection (e) of this Section.

- (3) The City Issued Regulation Container shall be used by the Household Waste Generator solely for storage and collection of household waste by the City of Syracuse. Other uses of the City Issued Regulation Container are prohibited.
- (4) Once the City Issued Regulation Container has been provided, this is the only container that should be used for disposal of non-recyclable solid waste at the Property. Failure to use the City Issued Regulation Container will initially result in the Commissioner or an authorized representative of the City of Syracuse, including but not limited to the Director of the City of Syracuse Division of Code Enforcement, providing a warning to the property owner that City Issued Regulation Containers must be used. Continued noncompliance with the provisions of this Article will result in the City enforcing the provisions of Section 14-70 below.
- (5) The City Issued Regulation Container shall be owned by the City but it shall be the responsibility of the property owner and all Household Waste Generators at the premises to maintain the City Issued Regulation Container in a safe and sanitary condition.
- (6) The City Issued Regulation Container must remain at the address of the residential property for which it was issued and shall be left for use by the new owner or occupant should the residential property be sold or transferred during the Program.
- (7) No City Issued Regulation Container shall be set out before 6:00 p.m. of the day preceding the scheduled pickup.
- (8) All City Issued Regulation Containers must be set out in plain view from the street and must be set adjacent to the curb line or edge of the road unless otherwise directed by the City.
- (9) All City Issued Regulation Containers must be removed from plain view from the street following collection of the household waste no later than 7:00 p.m. on the date of scheduled pickup.
- (10) With the exception of the references to Regulation Containers which are not applicable to the Routes participating in this Program, Household Waste Generators provided a City Issued Regulation Container pursuant to this Article shall continue to follow the Operating Rules and Regulations for Household Waste Generators as detailed in Section 14-18 of Article 2 of this Chapter.
- (11) No Refuse shall be placed or stored on any premises within the City except as permitted by this Chapter.
- (12) Household Waste and Refuse shall be placed in bags, deposited promptly and stored in City Issued Regulation Containers.
- (13) City Issued Regulation Containers must not be filled over their level capacity.

- (14) City Issued Regulation Containers shall be placed by the owner and/or occupant of the premises where such Refuse originated at the rear or side yard of the main building on such premises. Such Refuse shall be stored in a manner so as not to create a health hazard or public nuisance.
- (15) Any substantial accumulation of refuse or waste is hereby declared to be a sanitary health hazard and a public nuisance.
- (16) Refuse shall not be placed or stored in the street, sidewalk or gutters or in any public place except as directed herein or by the Commissioner.
- (17) The Commissioner shall have the authority to abate any sanitary health hazard or public nuisance and to impose the fees, charges and penalties of this Chapter as well as the cost of disposal for such abatement.
- (18) During the Program, circumstances may arise where it is necessary for the City Issued Regulation Container to be replaced. In such circumstances the property owner or their authorized representative shall contact the City of Syracuse Department of Public Works to request delivery of a replacement City Issued Regulation Container. Requests for replacements should be made as soon as possible so that the property can dispose of household waste on schedule. Upon enactment of this legislation the replacement City Issued Regulation Container shall be provided at no cost to the property owner; however, the Commissioner reserves the right to establish a fee schedule for replacement of City Issued Regulation Containers should such charges be deemed necessary.
- (19) Until the Commissioner has included their neighborhood as a designated Route and provided a City Issued Regulation Container, Household Waste Generators shall continue to use their own Regulation Containers and follow the Operating Rules and Regulations for Household Waste Generators as detailed in Section 14-18 of Article 2 of this Chapter.

#### Section 14-69. Report on the Program

The Commissioner shall provide the Mayor and the Common Council with a report detailing the data collected during the rollout of the Program following the completion of the first year of the conversion to the City Issued Regulation Containers. This report shall include any issues that were encountered during the rollout of the Program and the Commissioner's recommendations for continuation, expansion or changes to the Program. The Mayor and Common Council may request a formal report on the Program at any time during the course of the Program.

#### Section 14-70. Penalties and remedies for violation

(a) Except as otherwise provided herein, any person or Waste Generator who shall knowingly and willfully violate or assist in the violation of this article shall be guilty of an offense and

upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00). Each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate violation subject to a separate fine.

- (b) Except as otherwise provided herein, a violation of any provision of this article which shall result in the discharge or accumulation of solid waste shall be deemed a nuisance for purposes of civil remedies and shall be deemed to constitute a threat to public health and safety. Upon discovery of a discharge or accumulation of solid waste at a residential property it shall be the duty and responsibility of the Commissioner to: (i) provide notice of the condition to the Waste Generator and/or property owner where the violation has occurred by having a prominent marker placed at the site of the discharge or accumulation; (ii) mail notice of such condition to the Waste Generator and/or property owner where the violation has occurred to the address on file in the office of the department of finance, and if an address is not so filed, then notice shall be sent by certified mail to their last known address or place of residence; (iii) if the condition remains uncorrected for twenty-four (24) hours after the placement of a marker, the Commissioner shall take such actions as necessary to correct the condition, the cost of which shall be charged to the waste generator and/or property owner; (iv) a bill for the reasonable cost of the corrective action plus an administrative surcharge of the greater of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or fifty (50) percent of the cost of the corrective action shall be delivered to the Waste Generator and/or the property owner where the violation has occurred; and the commissioner of assessment shall be authorized to add any unpaid amount of said bill to the next succeeding property tax bill as a "special solid waste charge" which shall be a lien against the property.
- (c) In addition to the above-provided penalties and revocations, or in lieu thereof, the Corporation Counsel may also institute and maintain an action or proceeding in the name of the City of Syracuse in a court of competent jurisdiction to compel compliance with or to restrain by temporary restraining order, preliminary and/or permanent injunction, any violation of this ordinance.

; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that these amendments to Chapter 14 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse, as amended, shall be effective immediately, provided that those provisions of Chapter 14 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse, as amended, which are unchanged by these amendments shall remain in full force and effect and shall be regarded for all purposes as having been in effect continuously and any new provisions shall be applied prospectively.

Dear Ms. McBride:

Please prepare legislation for the next regular meeting of the Common Council to amend Article 2 of Chapter 14 of the Revised General Ordinances entitled "Solid Waste Collection and Disposal" to authorize the Commissioner to establish a Program for updating the City's Solid Waste and Recycling Collection System for Household Waste Generators.

The amended General Ordinance will add new sections to facilitate the rollout of the new residential cart program for waste collection. Specifically, these sections will deal with:

- (a) Converting DPW's Solid Waste Collection System for Household Waste Generators from the current system of using Regulation Containers owned and supplied by residential property owners to a new system of using City Issued Regulation Containers. This Program will initially focus only on the Solid Waste that is not classified as Recyclable, with the intention to convert to a similar system for the collection of recyclables at a later date.
- (b) The Commissioner shall be responsible for the creation of a plan to coordinate the distribution of City Issued Regulation Containers to Household Waste Generators in the City of Syracuse.
- (c) The Commissioner will be responsible for designating the Routes for this Program. The Commissioner will designate at least five (5) Routes for participation in the initial rollout of the Program. The Routes selected by the Commissioner shall be reflective of conditions across the City of Syracuse in order to collect data that will help determine how to successfully complete a City-wide conversion to City Issued Regulation Containers. Once the Program is underway the Commissioner shall determine any changes that need to be made to the initial list of designated

Routes and when additional Routes will be added to the Program. The Initial Routes selected by the Commissioner shall cover various collection days in order to represent the City's normal waste collection schedule.

- (d) The Department of Public Works, pursuant to the necessary authorizations from the Mayor and the Common Council, has purchased an initial supply of City Issued Regulations Containers. As the Routes are designated by the Commissioner, the Department of Public Works will deliver a City Issued Regulation Container to each residential property on the designated Route. The selection of Routes and distribution of the City Issued Regulation Containers will be done in Phases until the Program has become City-wide.
- (e) For areas of the City that have been determined by the Commissioner to be topographically unsuitable for the use of the City Issued Regulation Containers, the Household Waste Generators will continue to use their own Regulation Containers in accordance with the requirements of Article 2 of this Chapter.
- (f) Property owners and/or their authorized representatives for non-owner occupied properties will receive notice of the designation of their neighborhood as a Route participating in the program. Such notice will also provide information regarding the delivery of the City Issued Container and the date that the property owner or tenants of the residential property shall be required to cease using their current Regulation Container and begin to use the City Issued Regulation Container. The Notice will provide information on the specifics of the Program and provide contact information for questions or concerns. Individuals who require special accommodations should contact the Department of Public Works as soon as possible after receipt of the Notice.

Existing sections and definitions of the current Solid Waste Ordinance will continue to apply to those neighborhoods where the rollout has not occurred.

Dear Ms. McBride:

I request the following legislation for the next meeting of the Common Council be prepared:

An Ordinance authorizing the City of Syracuse to Accept the lining of three sewer manholes and the replacement of their frames & covers by CenterState CEO, the owner of the Syracuse Tech Garden Building Addition project (235 Harrison Street) at No Cost to the City. The three sewer manholes to be lined and the frames & covers replaced shall be located along the 200 block of East Onondaga Street and the 100 Block of Madison Street. This is a result of the Onondaga County's 1:1 offset requirement (Local Law No.1, 2011).

This department has reviewed, coordinated with other City departments and is of the opinion that the installed facilities described in the plans and specifications on file at the City Engineer's office are to the benefit of the public use of the streets. It is therefore, recommended that an ordinance be submitted for consideration by the Common Council permitting the Department of Public Works to accept own and maintain the above described infrastructure improvements constructed in the City Right of Way's by CenterState CEO as part of the Onondaga County's 1:1 offset requirement as shown on the plans as forwarded to the Department of Engineering prepared for CenterState CEO by CHA and titled "Sewer Lining Plan", dated October 11, 2022.

 CenterState CEO shall construct, without cost to the City, and in accordance with plans, specifications and final locations to be approved by the City Engineer, and the Commissioner of Public Works, the lining and replacement of frames & covers of three sewer manholes along the 200 block of East Onondaga Street and the 100 Block of Madison Street which are the subjects of this action.

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- 2. The plans and specifications required to construct all facilities subject to this ordinance shall be prepared by a Professional Engineer registered by the State of New York. The plans for the work shall be approved by the City Engineer, and record drawings, including AutoCad and GIS formats on magnetic media referenced to New York State plane coordinate, Central Zone shall be provided to the City Engineer subsequent to the completion of the work. CenterState CEO shall endeavor to provide a certification by a Professional Engineer as to the accuracy of the as-built drawings and attest to the fact that the improvements were constructed in conformity with the plans and specifications approved by the City. As-built drawings and a certification of completion shall be submitted within 30 days after the Department of Public Works has determined that the project is complete. If this information is not received, you will be subject to a \$500.00 penalty fee and additional collection fees if necessary.
- 3. That traffic shall be maintained at all times during construction. The entire excavation of said work is to be protected by suitable guards and signal both by day and night and precautions are to be taken by all reasonable means to prevent any accident or injury while the work is in progress.
- 4. That said applicant, its successors or assigns, shall within thirty (30) days from the adoption of this Ordinance execute and file in the Office of the City Clerk written acceptance of this permission and consent.
- 5. That all ordinances, rules and regulations of the City and its departments shall at all times be complied with including the Building Code of the City of Syracuse.
- 6. The Work shall be subject to street cut and repair permitting process administered by the Commissioner of Public Works and any other standard permitting processes that exist. Restoration of pavement shall be completed in accordance with all City of Syracuse standards and as ordered by the City Engineer.
- 7. That the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works shall be advised in advance of time when the work is to be done and the work of installation, including shoring, protection of pipes and facilities and other safety measures, shall be subject to the supervision of the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works.
- 8. All work shall be done in a skillful manner with reasonable dispatch and in accordance with plans and specifications and all conditions imposed by any laws, rules or regulations which may apply to the work. A dust and sediment and erosion control program shall be in effect for the duration of the project to prevent a nuisance and to prevent interference with or damage to adjacent property, streets, sewers and drainage courses.
- 9. That CenterState CEO shall adequately and properly protect any existing underground utilities located within or near said installation. If any such property or facilities are interfered with or damaged, CenterState CEO, or its successors and assigns, shall be responsible for replacement to

the satisfaction of the City Engineer. Should the City Engineer determine that City facilities or utilities require relocation, temporary support or other modification as a result of this Work, said modifications shall be made as directed by the City Engineer.

- 10. That CenterState CEO, its successors, assigns, and agents shall obtain and keep in force for the duration of this permission, a general liability insurance policy, in the amount of \$2,000,000, naming the City of Syracuse as an additional insured. A Certificate of said insurance, along with the declaration page or blanket endorsement confirming the City of Syracuse as an additional insured shall be submitted to the City Engineer, Department of Engineering, Room 401 City Hall, 233 E. Washington Street, Syracuse, NY 13202.
- 11. That CenterState CEO, their successors, assigns, and agents shall at all times defend and indemnify and save harmless the City of Syracuse, its officers and servants from any and all liability and from any and all claims, damages, costs and expenses of every name and nature to person or property which may accrue or grow out of the CIPP lining and spot repairs and associated improvements in said streets and shall defend and indemnify and save harmless said City from all costs, damages and expenses by reason of any damages or injuries to any gas pipe, water pipe, sewers, other utilities, pipes or construction work now located in, under and along the surface of said street at the point and place or places where said work is to be performed and maintained.
- 12. The foregoing conditions may be modified or expanded from time to time as agreed upon by the Corporation Counsel, City Engineer and CenterState CEO.
- 13. The construction and restoration permitted by the terms of this ordinance must be carried out and completed within two (2) years from the date of its adoption.
- 14. All monuments shall be referenced prior to construction. If any monuments are disturbed or moved, the monuments shall be replaced in the same location and recertified by a licensed surveyor to the City of Syracuse. All expenses for the above shall be paid for by CenterState CEO.
- 15. Follow all weather and seasonal limitations per City/NYSDOT specifications for all construction in the City R.O.W.. By consequence of the ordinance or subsequent approvals authorized by the ordinance, the City of Syracuse makes no representation, express or implied, as to the feasibility of the proposed plans or Work or to the extent of Work involved in accommodating any existing utility or facility located within the City rights-of-way. Any coordination with the various utility operators, private and/or public, is the responsibility of CenterState CEO. Upon completion of the facilities and acceptance and approval of the improvements by the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works, the use, operation and maintenance of the lining of the three manholes shall revert to the City.

- 16. The City reserves the right to reject any and all materials, workmanship of the planned work at any time during construction.
- 17. The City shall be notified, consulted and prior approval obtained on all field changes/field change sheets, RFI's etc. related to the work of this approval.
- 18. CenterState CEO shall provide full-time consultant engineering inspection during the lining of the three sewer manholes to be accepted by the City of Syracuse. The Consultant Inspector shall have experience in sewer manhole lining in the public R.O.W. The Consultant shall keep daily inspection records and provide them to the City of Syracuse. All construction in the City's R.O.W. shall meet current ADA regulations. All construction and inspection documentation including but not limited to shop drawings, pre and post TV inspection logs and digital copies of the videos, and as-built drawings shall be handed over to the City for their review and approval prior to the City's acceptance of the work.
- 19. Prior to acceptance of any construction to be handed over to the City, the independent Inspector and the City shall inspect the work. The contractor shall then complete all items on the punch list.
- 20. The completed work shall be subject to approval by the Commissioner of Public Works and the City Engineer, and CenterState CEO shall warranty the same for two (2) years from the date of acceptance.
- 21. Failure or refusal of the CenterState CEO to complete the work as required by this ordinance shall result in City of Syracuse holding the temporary certificate of occupancy and the certificate of occupancy for the Syracuse Tech Garden Building Addition Project located at 235 Harrison Street until the work is complete.

Additional terms and conditions, as recommended by the City Engineer and the Corporation Counsel, shall be set forth in the Ordinance.

An Ordinance Granting Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC a Revocable Permission to construct, own, operate and maintain an underground electrical ductbank, consisting of six 6" conduits crossing the Irving Avenue (900 Block) Right of Way and six 6" conduit crossing the Stadium Place (100 Block) Right of Way. Sections in the City Right of Way are part of larger ductbank system being built on lands owned by Syracuse University. The approximate length of each ductbank crossing in the R.O.W. is sixty-six feet (66'). Syracuse University (University) entered into a long-term concession and operating agreement with CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC. This agreement does not transfer ownership rights, nor does it constitute a lease. Rather, it obligates CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC to operate, maintain, control, and improve the existing utility systems for steam and chilled water and electric including assets located at the plants and the distribution systems. With this agreement in place, CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC will now be responsible for completion of maintenance and capital improvements on these utility systems. CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC hold the contracts for both design and construction of this work.

The revocable permission for the underground ductbank will be subject to the following:

- Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC shall construct, without cost to the City, and in accordance with plans, specifications, and final locations to be approved by the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the Commissioner of Water, the ductbank and appurtenances (the "Work") which are the subjects of this action.
- The plans and specifications required to construct all facilities subject to this ordinance shall be prepared by a Professional Engineer registered by the State of New York. The plans for the work shall be approved by the City Engineer, and record drawings, including AutoCad and GIS formats on magnetic media referenced to New York State plane coordinate, Central Zone shall be provided to the City Engineer subsequent to the completion of the work. Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC shall endeavor to provide a certification by a Professional Engineer as to the accuracy of the as-built drawings and attest to the fact that the improvements were constructed in conformity with the plans and specifications approved by the City. As-built drawings and a certification of completion shall be submitted within 30 days after the Department of Public Works has determined that the project is complete. If this information is not received, you will be subject to a \$500.00 penalty fee and additional collection fees if necessary.
- 3. That traffic shall be maintained at all times during construction. The entire excavation of said work is to be protected by suitable guards and signal both by day and night and precautions are to be taken by all reasonable means to prevent any accident or injury while the work is in progress.
- That Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC their successors, assigns, and agents shall at all times defend and indemnify and save harmless the City of Syracuse, its officers and servants from any and all liability and from any and all claims, damages, costs and expenses of every name and nature to person or property which may accrue or grow out of the installation, operation, and maintenance of such utility lines in said streets or arising in any way out of the operations for this consent, and shall defend and indemnify and save harmless said City from all costs, damages and expenses by reason of any damages or injuries to any gas pipe, water pipe, sewers, other utilities, pipes or construction work now located in, under and along the surface of said street at the point and place or places where said work is to be performed and maintained, including damages incurred as a result of damage to the Facilities caused by the City.
- 5. That said applicant, its successors or assigns, shall within thirty (30) days from the adoption of this Ordinance execute and file in the Office of the City Clerk written acceptance of this permission and consent.
- 6. That all ordinances, rules and regulations of the City and its departments shall at all times be complied with including the Building Code of the City of Syracuse.

- 7. The Work shall be subject to street cut and repair permitting process administered by the Commissioner of Public Works and any other standard permitting processes that exist. Restoration of pavement and sidewalks must be completed in accordance with all City of Syracuse standards.
- That the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works shall be advised in advance of time when the work is to be done and the work of installation, including shoring, protection of pipes and facilities and other safety measures, shall be subject to the supervision of the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works.
- 9. Subject to the City Engineer, review and approval, permission may be granted by the City for other utilities to cross the area to be occupied by the proposed facilities.
- 10. All work shall be done in a skillful manner with reasonable dispatch and in accordance with plans and specifications and all conditions imposed by any laws, rules or regulations which may apply to the work. A dust and sediment and erosion control program shall be in effect for the duration of the project to prevent a nuisance and to prevent interference with or damage to adjacent property, streets, sewers, and drainage courses.
- 11. That Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC shall adequately and properly protect any existing underground utilities located within or near said installation. If any such property or facilities are interfered with or damaged, Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC, or its successors and assigns, shall be responsible for replacement to the satisfaction of the City Engineer. Should the City Engineer determine that City facilities or utilities require relocation, temporary support, or other modification as a result of this Work, said modifications shall be made as directed by the City Engineer.
- That Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC, its successors, assigns, and agents shall, upon request by the City, permit the construction, installation, repair, replacement and removal of any and all utilities necessary at any time in the future to be located or placed within said lines and appurtenances; and Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC shall agree to assume any excess of the normal cost of installation of such utilities occasioned by the existence of said lines and appurtenances in said streets.
- 13. That Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC, its successors, assigns, and agents shall obtain and keep in force for the duration of this permission, a general liability insurance policy, in the amount of \$2,000,000, naming the City of Syracuse as an additional insured. A Certificate of said insurance, along with the declaration page or blanket endorsement confirming the City of Syracuse as an additional insured shall be submitted to the City Engineer, Department of Engineering, Room 401 City Hall, 233 E. Washington Street, Syracuse, NY 13202.
- 14. That Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC, its successors, assigns, and agents shall agree that the City, acting through its City Engineer shall have the authority to request any on site investigations, excavations, or actions, to be taken at the sole expense of Syracuse University and

- CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC, which are necessary to ensure that the excavation of these City Streets does not damage or impair City utilities.
- 15. That this permission and consent is temporary and revocable and all rights under this ordinance shall cease and be terminated at the expiration of sixty (60) days from the adoption by the Common Council of an ordinance terminating the same and thereupon, said applicant, its successors or assigns, shall remove said lines and work in connection therewith and restore the street, sidewalk and all other facilities wholly at the cost and expense of said applicant, its successors or assigns.
- 16. Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC, or its designated representative, shall be a member, for the life of the proposed facilities, of the Underground Facilities Protection Organization, Inc. or the existing "one call" organization established to facilitate the requirements of New York State Industrial Code Rules No. 53 or any relevant modifications thereto.
- 17. All utility installations must maintain a minimum of five (5) foot separation from the water main joints, tees, and valves. All utilities shall be installed in accordance with Ten State Standards which require 10-foot horizontal clearance from water main and service lateral and 18-inch vertical clearance at crossing of water main.
- 18. The foregoing conditions may be modified or expanded from time to time as agreed upon by the Corporation Counsel, City Engineer, and Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC.
- 19. The construction and restoration permitted by the terms of this ordinance must be carried out and completed within two (2) years from the date of its adoption.
- 20. All monuments shall be referenced prior to construction. If any monuments are disturbed or moved, the monuments shall be replaced in the same location and recertified by a licensed surveyor to the City of Syracuse. All expenses for the above shall be paid for by Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC.
- 21. Vertical clearances of 18" or less and horizontal clearances of 5' or less between any proposed structure / utility and Syracuse sewer mains requires approval of the City Engineer.
- 22. Upon completion of the facilities and acceptance and approval of the roadway restoration by the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works, the use, operation and maintenance of the roadway and utilities located therein will be subject to all laws, rules, ordinances, and procedures which apply to streets and utilities throughout the City.
- 23. Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC shall replace a section of the 15" sewer main along Stadium place as required as shown on the referenced plans prepared by Peterson Guadagnolo at no cost to the City of Syracuse. Syracuse University and CentTrio shall provide full time Engineering Inspection Services during the construction on the sewer. Sewer flows shall be

maintained during the work. The sewer shall be TV inspected prior to the start of the construction and at the completion of the sewer replacement, a digital copy of the pre & post TV inspection shall be provided to the City to review, any defects in the sewer replacement section, or defects in the existing sewer attributable to the construction by Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC, and their contractor shall be repaired as ordered by the City Engineer at no cost to the City of Syracuse.

- 24. Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC shall relocate & replace the 10" water main & associated fittings as required and as shown the plans prepared by Peterson Guadagnolo at no cost to the City of Syracuse. Sections of existing pipe to remain shall be protected & supported as required. All construction shall meet Syracuse Water Departments standards and specifications, Syracuse Department of Water shall be notified when the water mains are exposed so their condition may be inspected.
- 25. Fees- Syracuse University and CenTrio Energy Syracuse, LLC shall pay an annual fee of Two Dollars Sixty-One Cents (\$2.61) per linear foot per 6" conduit placed underground in the City's Public Right-of-Way. The per linear foot per conduit charge shall be calculated based on the as built record drawings submitted to the City Engineer, to the City as adjusted annually by any increases in the United States Consumer Price Index (US CPI) as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics or its successor, to the City on or before July 31 of each year that this permission is in force. (Estimated fee: Irving Avenue, six 6" conduits @ 66' ea. for an estimated fee of \$1033.56 and Stadium Place, six 6" conduits @ 66', for an estimated fee of \$1033.56; for a total estimated fee of \$2067.12)

Additional terms and conditions, as recommended by the City Engineer and the Corporation Counsel, shall be set forth in the Ordinance.

- WHEREAS, the applicant, Glass America, is requesting a Special Permit for Light-Duty Motor Vehicle Repair in order to establish a motor vehicle glass repair shop on property situated at 1011-1055 (aka 1031) West Genesee Street pursuant to Part B, Section III, Article 2 and Part C, Section IV, Articles 1 and 2 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on the request on January 30, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. in the Common Council Chambers, City Hall, Syracuse, New York, heard all those desiring to be heard, and duly recorded their testimony; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission has studied the proposal and all submittals by the applicant and all interested parties; and
- WHEREAS, the subject property is irregular in shape with 500.23 feet of frontage on West Genesee Street, 172.04 feet of frontage on North Geddes Street, and 99 feet of frontage on Park Avenue; and
- WHEREAS, the property lies within a Business, Class A zoning district, as do the adjacent and neighboring properties to the north and southeast; adjacent and neighboring properties to the west, south and east lie within a Residential, Class A zoning district' adjacent and neighboring properties to the east and north lie within a Commercial, Class A zoning district; and
- WHEREAS, land use in the area consists primarily of commercial, office, and retail uses along West Genesee Street; and

- WHEREAS, additional land uses on the site include ten retail spaces consisting of Dollar Tree, EarQ, Smoker's Choice, Jreck's Sub, Cingular Wireless, a liquor store, Aldi's, and three unidentified retail spaces; and a child day care center, and Avis Car Rental, both of which are located within the subject building known as 1031 West Genesee Street; and

- WHEREAS, the hours of operation will be from 7:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, with a maximum of 8 employees on premises at one time; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant is proposing to maintain "existing" signage, presumably changing the text or copy of the existing signage, but has not submitted any sign specifications; existing signage that was approved as part of the Special Permit for Indoor Amusement and Recreation (SP-15-18) included two, non-illuminated wall signs totaling 48 square feet consisting of a 6-foot by 3-foot wall sign on the east elevation and a 10-foot by 3-foot wall sign on the west elevation; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant submitted a site plan (Sheet SP) dated January 19, 2023, which illustrates 331 off-street parking spaces; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant submitted a floor plan (Sheet A-1) dated 1/83/2023 (sic) for Glass America at 1031 West Genesee Street which illustrates the proposed tenant, Glass America, with a total area of 2,709 square feet consisting of a vehicle workshop with an existing overhead door and a customer waiting area and reception office; and
- WHEREAS, the floor plan illustrates two additional tenants, a daycare center known as "All about Me Child Care", and a car rental tenant (Avis Car Rental); and
