A LOCAL LAW OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE AUTHORIZING A PROPERTY TAX LEVY IN EXCESS OF THE LIMIT ESTABLISHED IN GENERAL MUNICIPAL LAW §3-C

BE IT ENACTED, by the Common Council of the City of Syracuse, as follows:

Section 1. It is the intent of this local law to allow the City of Syracuse to adopt a budget for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2023 that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the "tax levy limit" as defined by General Municipal Law §3-c.

Section 2. This local law is adopted pursuant to subdivision 5 of General Municipal Law §3-c, which expressly authorizes a local government's governing body to override the property tax cap for the coming fiscal year by the adoption of a local law approved by a vote of sixty percent (60%) of said governing body.

Section 3. The Common Council of the City of Syracuse, County of Onondaga, is hereby authorized to adopt a budget for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2023 that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the amount otherwise prescribed in General Municipal Law §3-c.

Section 4. If a court determines that any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this local law or the application thereof to any person, firm or corporation, or circumstance is invalid or unconstitutional, the court's order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this local law or in its application to the person, individual, firm or corporation or circumstance, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or ordered shall be rendered.

Section 5. This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any fees charged by the City for the use of the Properties* shall be consistent with the fees the Department of Parks, Recreation and Youth Programs charges for similar events at the other City Parks; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that all fees will be deposited in Account #420010.01 or such other account as determined by the Commissioner of Finance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that said agreement shall be subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to terms, form and legality.

BE IT ORDAINED, that Ordinance No. 42-2022 is hereby amended to read as follows:

BE IT ORDAINED, that this Common Council hereby appropriates the sum of \$375,000 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) funds received by the City of Syracuse to an account to be determined by the Commissioner of Finance; said funds are to be utilized to establish a Syracuse Festivals Fund to support festivals that will be held from approximately May 2022 through September 30 2023*, in the manner provided by law; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the Syracuse Festivals Fund shall be administered by the Downtown Syracuse Foundation, a 501 (c) 3 not-for-profit corporation. There will be an administrative fee not to exceed 10% of the funding, which will be reinvested into revitalization programs for Downtown Syracuse; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that an application process, criteria, and detailed reporting system that are commensurate with ARPA compliance requirements will be developed to administer the funds for the Syracuse Festivals Fund; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that all festivals that are held within the City of Syracuse,

regardless of neighborhood location, will be eligible to apply for funds from the Syracuse Festivals Fund; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that ARPA funds can be used to cover direct costs such as booking and supplying performers, artists, staging, tenting, lighting and audio/visual needs, permitting and venue related fees, and marketing to attract and draw in visitors and patrons; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the Mayor be and he hereby is authorized to execute an agreement, , with Downtown Syracuse Foundation to administer the \$375,000 in ARPA funds for the Syracuse Festivals Fund on behalf of the City of Syracuse; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the term of the Agreement is hereby extended until October 31, 2023; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the agreement shall be subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to terms, form and execution; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that upon execution of the aforementioned agreement, the ARPA funds will be expended, subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Finance.

BOND ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,875,000.00) TO DEFRAY THE COST AND EXPENSE OF THE 2023/2024 UNIMPROVED STREET PROGRAM (SLURRY SEAL)

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Common Council of the City of Syracuse as follows:

Section 1. For the class of objects or purposes of providing funds to defray the cost and expense of the improvements to streets included in the Unimproved Street Program of the City of Syracuse in Fiscal Year 2023/2024, said streets including those designated in "Appendix A" attached hereto by or under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Works, pursuant to the provision of Chapter 684 of the Laws of 1905, as amended, One Million Eight Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$1,875,000.00), general obligation bonds of the City of Syracuse, to be of the terms, form and contents hereinafter provided for, are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York.

Section 2. One Million Eight Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$1,875,000.00) is estimated as the maximum cost of the class of objects or purposes for which such bonds are to be issued.

Section 3. The plan for financing such class of objects or purposes consists of the issuance and sale of bonds of the City of Syracuse in the principal sum of One Million Eight Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$1,875,000.00), thereby providing such sum for all the maximum cost of such class of objects or purposes which is to be borne by the City of Syracuse and thereafter assessed against abutting property owners as provided by law.

Section 4. It is hereby determined that the class of objects or purposes for which bonds are to be issued falls within subdivision 20 (b) of paragraph (a) Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law and the period of probable usefulness of such class of objects or purposes is ten (10) years.

Section 5. The Commissioner of Finance, not more than fifteen (15) days and not less than three (3) days before the sale of said bonds, shall file with the Comptroller of the State of New York a supplemental debt statement and file a duplicate thereof with the City Clerk in compliance with Section 109.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance who is the chief fiscal officer of the City under the Local Finance Law. The Commissioner of Finance may sell such bonds at public or private sale with or without bond insurance or other credit enhancement, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine is most favorable to said City, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Commissioner of Finance, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby authorized to issue variable rate debt and to enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds, as authorized under Sections 54.90 and 168.00 of the Local Finance Law. Said bonds shall be signed in the name of the City by the original or facsimile signature of the Mayor and countersigned by the original or facsimile signature of the Commissioner of Finance and sealed with the original or facsimile corporate seal of the City, provided, however, that if the signatures of the Mayor and the Commissioner of Finance are each by facsimile signatures on any bond, such bond shall be authenticated by the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent of the City. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds (and if said bonds are to be executed in the name of the City by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the City), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Commissioner of Finance. The Commissioner of Finance may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds, or may contract on behalf of the City for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine. The Commissioner of Finance may also agree on behalf of the City to provide or disclose such information about the City as may be necessary to enable the purchasers of bonds or notes of the City to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12.

Section 7. The temporary use of available funds of the City of Syracuse, not immediately required for the purpose or purposes for which the same were raised or otherwise created, is hereby authorized pursuant to Section 165.10 of the Local Finance Law, for the capital purposes described in Section 1 of this ordinance. The reasonably expected source of funds to be used to initially pay for the expenditures authorized by Section 1 of this resolution shall be from the City's General

Fund. It is intended that the City shall then reimburse expenditures from the General Fund with the proceeds of the bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized by this ordinance and that the interest payable on the bonds and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of such bonds shall be excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. This ordinance is intended to constitute the declaration of the City's "official intent" within the meaning of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 to reimburse the expenditures authorized by this ordinance with the proceeds of the bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized herein. Other than as specified in this ordinance, no monies are reasonably expected to be received, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 8. When said bonds and notes shall have been duly sold, the same shall be delivered by the Commissioner of Finance to the purchaser upon payment to him of the purchase price, including accrued interest, and the receipt of the Commissioner of Finance shall be a full acquittance to such purchaser who shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase money.

Section 9. The faith and credit of the City of Syracuse are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal of said bonds and interest thereon when due. An amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said obligations as the same become due and payable in each year shall be assessed in the first instance against abutting property owners as provided by law, but if the moneys collected thereby shall prove insufficient, any such insufficiency shall be included in the annual budget of said City consistent with the requirements for the repayment of faith and credit obligations of the City.

Section 10. The validity of the bonds hereby authorized may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the City of Syracuse is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication

of this ordinance are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 11. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE UNIMPROVED STREET PROGRAM (SLURRY SEAL) IN THE CITY OF SYRACUSE IN THE YEAR 2023/2024

BE IT ORDAINED, that this Common Council hereby authorizes the Unimproved Street Program (Slurry Seal) in the City of Syracuse in the year 2023/2024 in the unimproved streets as shown on Appendix "A" attached hereto, by or under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to perform the necessary work therefor, in whole or in part with his own forces, or in whole or in part by contract or contracts entered into in the manner provided by law, at a total cost not to exceed One Million Eight Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$1,875,000.00) charging the cost thereof to proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized contemporaneously by ordinance of this Common Council, and thereafter to be assessed against abutting property owners by local assessment as provided by law.

BOND ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF FOUR MILLION FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,500,000.00) TO DEFRAY THE COST AND EXPENSE OF THE 2023/2024 MUNICIPAL SIDEWALK PROGRAM

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Common Council of the City of Syracuse as follows:

Section 1. For the class of objects or purposes of providing funds to defray the cost and expense of reconstructing sidewalks in the streets of the City of Syracuse as part of the 2023/2024 Municipal Sidewalk Program by or under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Works of said City, in accordance with Local Law No. 2-2021, enacted to amend the Syracuse Public Works Act to establish a fee based Municipal Sidewalk Program, at cost not to exceed Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000.00,) general obligation bonds of the City of Syracuse, to be of the terms, form and contents hereinafter provided for, shall be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York.

Section 2. Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000.00) is estimated as the maximum cost of the class of objects or purposes for which such bonds are to be issued.

Section 3. The plan for financing such class of objects or purposes consists of the issuance and sale of bonds of the City of Syracuse in the principal sum of Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000.00), thereby providing such sum for a part of the maximum cost of such object or purpose which is to be borne by the City of Syracuse and assessed against abutting property owners as provided by law.

Section 4. It is hereby determined that the class of objects or purposes for which bonds are to be issued falls within subparagraph 34 (b) of subdivision (a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance

Law and the period of probable usefulness of such class of objects or purposes is twelve (12) years because such class of objects or purposes is to be financed through a special fund into which the proceeds of the sale of the obligations authorized hereby and the assessments collected are to be paid and out of which the cost of such class of objects or purposes is to be paid and such obligations are to be redeemed.

Section 5. The Commissioner of Finance, not more than fifteen (15) days and not less than three (3) days before the sale of said bonds, shall file with the Comptroller of the State of New York a supplemental debt statement and file a duplicate thereof with the City Clerk in compliance with Section 109.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance who is the chief fiscal officer of the City under the Local Finance Law. The Commissioner of Finance may sell such bonds at public or private sale with or without bond insurance or other credit enhancement, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine is most favorable to said City, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Commissioner of Finance, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby authorized to issue variable rate debt and to enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds, as authorized under Sections 54.90 and 168.00 of the Local Finance Law. Said bonds shall be signed in the name of the

City by the original or facsimile signature of the Mayor and countersigned by the original or facsimile signature of the Commissioner of Finance and sealed with the original or facsimile corporate seal of the City, provided, however, that if the signatures of the Mayor and the Commissioner of Finance are each by facsimile signatures on any bond, such bond shall be authenticated by the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent of the City. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds (and if said bonds are to be executed in the name of the City by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the City), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Commissioner of Finance. The Commissioner of Finance may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds, or may contract on behalf of the City for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine. The Commissioner of Finance may also agree on behalf of the City to provide or disclose such information about the City as may be necessary to enable the purchasers of bonds or notes of the City to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. Section 7. The temporary use of available funds of the City of Syracuse, not immediately required for the purpose or purposes for which the same were raised or otherwise created, is hereby authorized pursuant to Section 165.10 of the Local Finance Law, for the capital purposes described in Section 1

of this ordinance. The reasonably expected source of funds to be used to initially pay for the expenditures authorized by Section 1 of this resolution shall be from the City's Capital Fund. It is intended that the City shall then reimburse expenditures from the Capital Fund with the proceeds of the bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized by this ordinance and that the interest payable on the bonds and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of such bonds shall be excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. This ordinance is intended to constitute the declaration of the City's "official intent" within the meaning of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 to reimburse the expenditures authorized by this ordinance with the proceeds of the bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized herein. Other than as specified in this ordinance, no monies are reasonably expected to be received, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 8. When said bonds and notes shall have been duly sold, the same shall be delivered by the Commissioner of Finance to the purchaser upon payment to him of the purchase price, including accrued interest, and the receipt of the Commissioner of Finance shall be a full acquittance to such purchaser who shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase money.

Section 9. The faith and credit of the City of Syracuse are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal of said bonds and interest thereon when due. An amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said bonds as the same becomes due each year shall be included in the annual budget of said City for the year.

Section 10. The validity of the bonds hereby authorized may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the City of Syracuse is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this ordinance are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting

such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 11. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO PROCEED WITH THE 2023/2024 MUNICIPAL SIDEWALK PROGRAM

BE IT ORDAINED, that this Common Council hereby authorizes the Department of Public Works to proceed with the 2023/2024 Municipal Sidewalk Program at various locations within the City of Syracuse including, but not limited to, the list of streets attached and incorporated into this Ordinance as Schedule "A" at an initial cost not to exceed \$4,500,000 and the Director of Management and Budget is hereby authorized to enter into a contract or contracts for the necessary services required for the Road Reconstruction Program in the manner provided by law; charging the cost thereof to proceeds of the sale of bonds in the amount of \$4,500,000 authorized contemporaneously herewith by ordinance of this Common Council and thereafter to be charged against abutting property owners in accordance with the approved fee schedule as provided by law; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to perform the necessary work therefor, in whole or in part, with his own forces, or in whole or in part by contract or contracts entered into in the manner provided by law.

- Ordinance authorizing the advertising of a public hearing, to be scheduled for May 8th at 1:00 p.m., related to authorization of the 2023/2024 Municipal Sidewalk Program, for all four quadrants of the City.
- Ordinance authorizing the sale and issuance of bonds to defray the cost of the 2023/2024
 Municipal Sidewalk Program at a cost not to exceed \$4,500,000.

Pursuant to Local Law No. 2-2021, The Commissioner of Public Works will make such improvements by the use of City forces or by contract with a private entity entered into in the manner provided by law. Attached please find the detailed work plan for the City Municipal Sidewalk Program for FY2023-24 as set forth in Exhibit A.

The associated costs of this program include labor, equipment, necessary legal fees, engineering costs, inspection fees, advertising fees, administrative costs and miscellaneous costs totaling \$4,500,000. The program costs are incorporated into the proposed City Budget for FY2023-24. The first year of this program, FY2022-23 City taxpayers were assessed a fee equivalent to \$20.00/year for residential parcels and \$60.00/year for commercial parcels. The second year of this program, FY2023-24 City taxpayers will be assessed a fee equivalent to \$40.00/year for residential parcels and \$120.00/year for commercial parcels.

The cost of the program will be funded by the fee and general obligation bonding. The fee will raise \$1,817,480 and the other \$2,682,520 will be bonded totaling \$4,500,000. Funds will be deposited into 12.81200.510100/540543/540551 on July 1, 2023.

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT WITH THE NEW YORK STATE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (NYSDOT) RELATIVE TO USE OF THE NEW YORK STATE OWNED SALT BARN AND LOT LOCATED OFF OF VAN RENSSELAER STREET IN SYRACUSE, NEW YORK BY THE CITY OF SYRACUSE FOR SALT AND MULCH STORAGE

WHEREAS, it is the policy of New York State to cooperate with local municipalities for the shared use of services, materials and/or equipment; and

WHEREAS, the City is in need of a location for salt and mulch storage and NYS owns a salt barn and lot located off Van Rensselaer Street, Syracuse, New York, that the City and the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) have identified as suitable for this purpose, and wish to enter into a three (3) year shared services agreement for the premises to allow its use by the City;; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, that the Mayor is hereby authorized to execute a Shared Services Agreement under the following terms:

- 1. NYSDOT and the City agree that the City may utilize the salt barn and lot located off Van Rensselaer Street, Syracuse, New York for storage of salt and mulch.
- 2. The term of the agreement shall be for a three (3) year period effective as of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2026.
- 3. There shall be no cost for the use of the building as the value of the agreement would be \$25,000 for NYSDOT and \$25,000 for the City, which would result in zero cost to each party.
- 4. NYSDOT's access to the salt brine well will not be obstructed.
- 5. In the event the NYSDOT uses any of the salt stored by the City, it will be replaced by NYSDOT.
- 6. The City will break up the salt so it is usable for the City and NYSDOT.
- 7. The City will continue to assist NYSDOT and Hire Ground in their litter clean up.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, the value of this agreement would be \$25,000 for NYS DOT and \$25,000 for the City of Syracuse which would result in zero cost to each party.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that said Agreement shall be subject to review by the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality.

ORDINANCE APPROVING A SPECIAL PERMIT FOR AN APARTMENT HOUSE ON PROPERTIES SITUATED AT 208, 210, 212-214, AND 224 ASHWORTH PLACE AND 316 PINE STREET

BE IT ORDAINED, that the following resolution adopted by the City Planning Commission of the City of Syracuse on April 24, 2023, pursuant to Article V, Chapter 13, of the Charter of the City of Syracuse-1960, as amended, approving the application of Northside Genesee Associates LLC, applicant, for a special permit for an apartment house in order to facilitate construction of a five-story apartment building with 286 dwelling units, 4450 square feet of amenity space, and 150 off street parking spaces, on properties situated at 208, 210, 212-214, and 224 Ashworth Place and 316 Pine Street, Syracuse, New York, pursuant to Part B, Section 1, Article 9, and Part C, Section IV, Articles 1 and 2 of the Zoning Rules and Regulations of the City of Syracuse, as amended, in the manner and upon the conditions stated, be and the same hereby is consented to and approved, namely:

A RESOLUTION APPROVING A SPECIAL PERMIT FOR AN APARTMENT HOUSE ON PROPERTIES SITUATED AT 208, 210, 212-214, AND 224 ASHWORTH PLACE, AND 316 PINE STREET

We, the duly appointed members of the City Planning Commission of the City of Syracuse, do this 24th day of April, 2023, adopt the following resolution:

- WHEREAS, the applicant, Northside Genesee Associates, LLC, is requesting a Special Permit for an Apartment House to facilitate the construction of a five-story apartment building with 286 dwelling units, 4,450 square feet of amenity space, and 150 off-street parking spaces on properties situated at 208, 210, 212-214, and 224 Ashworth Place, and 316 Pine Street pursuant to Part B, Section I, Article 9 and Part C, Section IV, Articles 1 and 2 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on the request on April 24, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. in the Common Council Chambers, City Hall, Syracuse, New York, heard all those desiring to be heard, and duly recorded their testimony; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission has studied the proposal and all submittals by the applicant and all interested parties; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal involves the demolition of existing structures and the construction of a five-story, 286-unit apartment building on seventeen properties situated at 206 and 208, 210, 212 (aka 212-214), 216, 218, 222, and 224 Ashworth Place, 316 Pine Street, and 1219-1221, 1225-1227, 1231, 1237, 1301, 1311, 1317, and 1323 East Genesee Street and situated in Residential, Class B and Class C zoning districts;
 - 206, 216, 218, and 222 Ashworth Place and 1219-1221, 1225-1227, 1231, 1237, 1301, 1311, 1317, and 1323 East Genesee Street lie within a Residential, Class B zoning district;
 - 208, 210, 212 (aka 212-214), and 224 Ashworth Place and 316 Pine Street lie within a Residential, Class C zoning district; and
- WHEREAS, due to the multiple properties and zoning districts involved with the project, the following companion applications are under review by the City Planning Commission:
 - a Resubdivision (R-23-19) to combine the seventeen properties into one new Lot;
 - a Project Site Review (PR-23-05) to review the overall design, as well as the density and parking requirements for that portion of the project situated within the Residential, Class B zoning district; and
 - a Special Permit for an Apartment House (SP-23-08) to review the yard, lot coverage, height, density, and parking location requirements for that portion of the project situated within the Residential, Class C zoning district; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Syracuse Board of Zoning Appeals is reviewing an Area Variance application (V-23-07) for the Residential, Class B front and side yard, and lot coverage requirements; and

- WHEREAS, the subject property is a proposed 78,826-square foot, irregular-shaped lot with 449.07 feet of frontage on East Genesee Street, 365.3 feet of frontage on Ashworth Place, and 125.85 feet of frontage on Pine Street; and
- WHEREAS, approximately 56,395 square feet of the proposed Lot lies within a Residential, Class B zoning district, and approximately 22,431 square feet of the proposed Lot lies within a Residential, Class C zoning district; and
- WHEREAS, neighboring properties to the north lie within Residential, Class C and Business, Class A zoning districts; neighboring properties to the south lie within Residential, Class B and Office, Class B zoning districts; adjacent and neighboring properties to the east lie within Residential, Class C, Residential, Class B, and Planned Development District zoning districts; adjacent and neighboring properties to the west lie within Residential, Class B, Residential, Class C, and Business, Class A zoning districts; and
- WHEREAS, land use in the area consists primarily of residential and office uses; and
- WHEREAS, the "Syracuse Land Use and Development Plan" designates the character of this site, which lies in the Eastside neighborhood, as Urban Neighborhood along Ashworth Place and Adapted Mansion Corridor along East Genesee Street; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant submitted a layout plan (Sheet C 101) dated April 11, 2023, which illustrates a proposed, five-story apartment building with first and fifth floor terraces, a surface parking lot with seven parking spaces and a 22-foot wide driveway on Pine Street, a 40-foot wide driveway (as measured at the street right-of-way pursuant to Part C, Section III, Article 2 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended) on Ashworth Place which widens to 45 feet to provide access to a utility room overhead door and a trash room overhead door, a second, 12-foot wide driveway on Ashworth Place to provide access to a second trash room overhead door, and a proposed concrete patio that encroaches into the East Genesee Street right-of-way; and
- WHEREAS, the layout plan illustrates a 10-foot wide sidewalk in front of the Ashworth Place façade of the building that does not connect with a five-foot wide sidewalk along Ashworth Place; and
- WHEREAS, the layout plan illustrates a transformer pad with solid stockade fencing set back five feet from the Ashworth Place street line; and
- WHEREAS, the layout plan illustrates the proposed apartment building with a two-foot setback from the East Genesee Street street line, a 3.2-foot setback from the Ashworth Place street line, and a 12.4-foot setback from the Pine Street street line; the layout plan illustrates side yard setbacks of 9.2 feet, 8 feet, and 11.6 feet; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant submitted exterior elevation renderings (Sheets 03 and 04), dated April 12, 2023, which illustrate the proposed apartment building with five stories and an overall height of approximately 60 feet facing East Genesee Street and five floors and an overall height of approximately 63 feet facing Ashworth Place; and

- WHEREAS, the elevation renderings illustrate proposed finishing materials consisting of brick, fiber cement panels, fiber cement lap siding, and clear anodized curtain walls; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant submitted floor plans (Sheet 01) dated April 12, 2023, which illustrate a basement-level parking garage with 143 off-street parking spaces, and a total of 286 dwelling units consisting of 87 studio apartments, 60 one-bedroom apartments, and 139 two bedroom apartments; and
- WHEREAS, the Level 1 floor plan illustrates approximately 4,450 square feet of amenity space; and
- WHEREAS, the floor plans illustrate a total of 83 dwelling units and 21 parking spaces within the RC-zoned portions of the site; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, with respect to the front yard, side yard, structural coverage, density, building height, and parking number and location regulations, necessitating five variances under consideration by the BZA (V-23-07) and eight waivers under consideration by the Planning Commission; two for the Residential, Class B density and parking requirements under the companion Project Site Review (PR-23-05) and six for the Residential, Class C front and side yard, structural coverage, density, building height, and parking location requirements under the subject Special Permit review (SP-23-08); and
- WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part B, Section I, Article 9, paragraph 5.a of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that the minimum front setback shall be 30 feet; the site plan illustrates a front yard setback within the RC-zoned portion of the site along Ashworth Place of 3.2 feet; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part B, Section I, Article 9, paragraph 5.b of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that RC-zoned side yards shall have an aggregate width of at least 25% of the lot width, neither of which shall be less than ten feet in width at any point, which yards shall not be occupied by any building or projection therefrom; as such, the proposal requires an aggregate side yard of 45.3 feet for the RC-zoned portions of the site along Ashworth Place; the site plan illustrates an 8-foot side yard within the RC-zoned portion of the site along Ashworth Place; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part B, Section I, Article 9, paragraph 8.c of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that no multiple-family dwelling shall be erected, altered or used which does not provide a lot area of at least 2,500 square feet for each family dwelling unit; the floor plans illustrate 83 dwelling units within the RC-zoned portions of the project; as such, the proposed 83 dwelling units require a lot area of at least 207,500 square feet; the proposed Lot has only 22,431 square feet of RC-zoned area; and

WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part B, Section I, Article 9, paragraph 9 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that no building or structure shall hereafter be erected or structurally altered to exceed a height of two stories, excluding stories used exclusively for parking purposes; provided, however, that the cumulative height of any building or structure shall not exceed 36 feet; the elevations illustrate the north elevation of the proposed apartment building along Ashworth Place with five stories and an overall height of 63 feet, and the south elevation along East Genesee Street with five stories and an overall height of 60 feet; and

WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part B, Section I, Article 9, paragraph 6.a of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that the maximum permitted structural coverage of buildings and structures on a (RC-zoned) lot shall be 25%; the site plan illustrates 22,431 square feet of RC-zoned property with approximately 13,012 square feet, or 58.%, of structural coverage; and

WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part C, Section III, Article 1, paragraph 1.u.(4)(a) of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that off-street parking facilities required as auxiliary to main uses shall be located within the same zoning district specified for the main use; approximately 83 dwelling units are situated within or substantially within the Residential, Class C-zoned portions of the site, thus requiring 83 off-street parking spaces to be provided within the Residential, Class C-zoned portion of the site; the applicant is proposing a total of 150 off-street parking spaces, of which approximately 21 spaces are located within the Residential, Class C-zoned portion of the site; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Part B, Section I, Article 9, paragraph 4 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, the City Planning Commission shall have the authority to waive the Residential, Class C requirements for yards, lot coverage, height, density and parking location when part of a Special Permit application provided that the requested waivers meet the following criteria:

- that the proposal does not substantially change the use, design, character or nature of the development of the property in question;
- that the proposal is not detrimental to the appropriate development of use of adjacent lands and buildings:
- that the proposal is not detrimental to the orderly flow of vehicular and pedestrian traffic on site and off site; and

WHEREAS, the proposal necessitates six waivers from Part B, Section I, Article 9 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, with respect to the Residential, Class C front yard, side yard, density, height limitation, structural coverage, and parking location requirements; and

WHEREAS, the proposal was submitted to the City of Syracuse Departments of Engineering and Public Works, and the Division of City Planning for review; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the State Environmental Conservation Law, as amended and the regulations promulgated thereunder (collectively "SEQRA"), the Commission is required to make a determination with respect to the environmental impact of any "action" (as defined by SEQRA) to be taken by the Commission and the consideration of the application constitutes such an action; and

WHEREAS, the Commission reviewed the application and the Environmental Assessment Form dated February 14, 2023 ("EAF") prepared by the applicant, and determined that the proposed action described therein constituted a "Type I" action (as said quoted terms is defined in SEQRA); and

WHEREAS, the Commission declares itself "Lead Agency" (as said quoted term is defined in SEQRA) with respect to an uncoordinated review pursuant to SEQRA, and finds that approval of the application as set forth herein will not have a significant effect on the environment, and the Commission hereby issues a negative declaration pursuant to SEQRA, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "A", which shall be filed in the office of the Commission.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that We, the duly appointed members of the City Planning Commission of the City of Syracuse, do this 24th day of April, 2023, APPROVE the request of Northside Genesee Associates, LLC for a Special Permit for an Apartment House to facilitate the construction of a five-story apartment building with 286 dwelling units, 4,450 square feet of amenity space, and 150 off-street parking spaces on properties situated at 208, 210, 212-214, and 224 Ashworth Place, and 316 Pine Street pursuant to Part B, Section I, Article 9 and Part C, Section IV, Articles 1 and 2 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said application be approved subject to compliance with the following conditions:

- 1. The subject premises shall be used, operated and maintained in a neat and orderly condition at all times; all outside storage of junk, bottles, cartons, boxes, debris and the like shall be restricted to appropriately screened enclosures not visible to the general public;
- 2. All construction, improvements and additions relating to this proposal, including those activities required in order to comply with the conditions of this approval, shall be completed by the applicant or its agents within twelve (12) months of the date of approval of this resolution by the City of Syracuse or this approval will be considered null and void; administrative extensions to this requirement for up to one year may be obtained from the Zoning Administrator at any time within the first twelve (12) months, after which, any and all extensions require approval from the City Planning Commission;
- 3. Improvements to the subject property and its use shall be substantially in accordance with the submitted plans on file in the City of Syracuse Office of Zoning Administration entitled:
- Layout Plan (Sheet C-101) Proposed Development, 1301 E. Genesee Street; prepared by: CHA; dated: 4/11/2023; scaled: as shown;

- Syracuse Housing Concept Plan (Sheet 00); prepared by: Passero Associates; dated: April 12, 2023; no scale;
- Syracuse Housing Area Plans (Sheet 01); prepared by: Passero Associates; dated: April 12, 2023; scaled: as shown;
- Syracuse Housing Elevations (Sheets 03 and 04); prepared by: Passero Associates; dated: April 12, 2023; scaled: as shown;
- 4. No signage was approved as part of this application; proposed signage must be submitted to the City of Syracuse Office of Zoning Administration for review and approval;
- 5. Any exterior lighting of the subject proposal shall be designed, located and maintained so as to prevent any direct rays of light from shining beyond the boundaries of the subject property;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Commission GRANTS the requested waivers from Part B, Section I, Article 9 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, as they pertain to the Residential, Class C front yard, side yard, density, height limitation, structural coverage, and parking location requirements as identified in the preamble to this resolution;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this approval is subject to approval by the City of Syracuse Board of Zoning Appeals of the companion Variance application (V-23-07) as noted in the preamble to this resolution;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that approval of this resolution does not relieve the applicant from compliance with any other regulatory or licensing provisions applicable thereto by the properly constituted Federal, State, County or City authorities to include, but not limited to the City of Syracuse Departments of Engineering and Public Works, and the Division of Code Enforcement;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if the conditions enumerated above are not complied with, this Special Permit shall be subject to revocation;



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

- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission approved a Special Permit for a Care Home (SP-90-44) on November 27, 1990; and
- WHEREAS, the subject property is an irregular-shaped corner lot with 198 feet of frontage on West Onondaga Street, 295.4 feet of frontage on Rich Street, and a lot area of approximately 40,452 square feet; and
- WHEREAS, the property lies within a Residential, Class B Transitional, as do the adjacent and neighboring properties to the northeast and southwest; adjacent and neighboring properties to the south and east lie within Residential, Class A and Residential, Class AA zoning districts; and
- WHEREAS, land use in the area consists primarily of residential uses; and
- WHEREAS, the "Syracuse Land Use and Development Plan" designates the character of this site, which lies within the Westside neighborhood, as Adapted Mansion Corridor; and

Please prepare legislation to be introduced at the May 8, 2023 Common Council meeting on behalf of the Department of Neighborhood and Business Development authorizing the Department of Neighborhood and Business Development to apply for funds through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Forest Service's Urban and Community Forestry program.

These funds would offer the opportunity to expand tree canopy, build capacity for community engagement with urban forestry planning, planting, and management, and support long term health, ecological, and economic benefits in the neighborhood. A total of \$1.5 billion has been made available through the program, which allows individual jurisdictions the opportunity to seek up to \$50 million over a five-year period. The program will operate in accordance with President Biden's Justice40 Initiative, which aims to deliver 40 percent of the overall benefits of climate and clean energy investments to disadvantaged communities.

The City of Syracuse is eligible to request up to \$50 million over a five-year period to implement programs that support expanded tree canopy, promote improved health, ecological, and economic benefits, and build capacity for stronger community engagement in urban forest planning, planting, and management. NBD, in partnership with the City Arborist, seeks to apply for the maximum allowable amount. If selected, 80% of all funding received would be made available as sub-grant awards to local community-based organizations and partners serving disadvantaged communities, as required under the terms of the program.

ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 240-2021 AS LAST AMENDED BY ORDINANCE NO. 37-2023 AUTHORIZING CONTRACT WITH CHERRYROAD TECHNOLOGIES (CRT) TO COMPLETE THE FOUR PHASES OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE PAYROLL MODERNIZATION PROGRAM

BE IT ORDAINED, that Ordinance No. 240-2021 as last amended by Ordinance No. 37-2023 is hereby amended to read as follows:

WHEREAS, Section 5-205-A of the Charter of the City of Syracuse, as amended, provides the Mayor shall "award contracts for professional services subject to the approval of the Common Council"; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor has approved the retention of CherryRoad Technologies (CRT), under the following terms:

- (1) Cherry Road Technologies (CRT) ("Cherry Road") shall provide the City's Office of Information Technology with the professional services required to complete the four phases of the City of Syracuse Payroll Modernization Program: (1) Telestaff Assessment & Implementation; (2) Telestaff Integration; (3) Kronos Implementation; and (4) AS400 Assessment.
- (2) The contract was originally for an eighteen (18) month period from the date of execution.
- Ordinance No. 240-2021 authorized the City to pay CherryRoad a total amount not to exceed \$1,921,455 to complete the initial four phases of the Payroll Modernization Program. The total cost not to exceed is based on an estimated cost of: (1) Up to \$776,083 for the Telestaff Assessment & Implementation Phase; (2) Up to \$129,600 for the Telestaff Integration Phase; (3) Up to \$864,932 for the Kronos Implementation Phase; (4) Up to \$150,840 for the AS400 Assessment Phase; and
- (4) Ordinance No. 240-2021 was amended by Ordinance No. 694-2021, authorizing the agreement with CherryRoad to be amended to increase the total not to exceed amount by \$277,185 to reflect the increase in the actual cost for continued development and

configuration with supporting change management activities of the city's payroll modernization platforms including Telestaff for Public Safety and Kronos WorkForce Central shall not exceed \$133,345 and reflect the actual cost for AS400 Retirement Blueprint for all legacy applications, including time keeping, payroll, and human resources (data migration and retention strategy, cut-over strategy, requirements gathering of legacy applications for conversion to newer platforms, and action plan) a dependency of full-out electronic time keeping shall not exceed \$143,840. Funding for this increase was appropriated contemporaneously by Ordinance No. 693-2021.

- (5) Ordinance No. 240-2021 was further amended by Ordinance No. 666-2022, authorizing an extension of the agreement with CherryRoad through December 21, 2022 for TeleStaff to provide additional staff augmentation services on behalf of the Syracuse Police Department and Syracuse Fire Department at a cost not to exceed \$33,000. Funding for this increase was appropriated contemporaneously by Ordinance No. 665-2022.
- (6) The agreement with CherryRoad is hereby authorized to be amended so as to extend the term of the agreement for the period of January 1, 2023 through <u>June 30, 2023*</u> for continued development and configuration services with supporting change management activities of the City's payroll modernization platforms at an additional cost not to exceed \$76,800.
- (7) Total costs for all services authorized under Ordinance No. 240-2021 shall not exceed \$ 2,308,440.00.

; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, that the Mayor, on behalf of the City of Syracuse, be and he hereby is authorized to execute such amended_contract, as hereinabove stated, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to terms, form and execution; and
