We, the duly appointed members of the Landmark Preservation Board of the City of Syracuse, do this 4th day of June 2020, adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the applicants, Dale and Ann Tussing, submitted an application for Protected Site designation pursuant to Part C, Section VII, Article 5 of the Zoning Rules and Regulations of the City of Syracuse, for the property located at 205 E. Seneca Turnpike (aka John Gridley House); and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2020, at 8:30AM via WebEx conferencing system, the Landmark Preservation Board held a Public Hearing for consideration as to whether said building should be recommended for designation as a Protected Site; and

WHEREAS, at the June 4, 2020 Landmark Preservation Board meeting following the Public Hearing, the Board studied all submittals regarding the history and existing condition of 205 E. Seneca Turnpike, as well as the testimony (oral and written) submitted prior to and at the time of the Public Hearing; and

WHEREAS, the Landmark Preservation Board noted in its review of the application:

- I. Scope of Work:
- 1) Protected Site designation of the property listed at 205 E. Seneca Turnpike. The designation applies to the exterior features, materials and finishes of the house, including but not limited to windows (sash, sills, lintels, decorative surrounds and trim), doorways and doorway surrounds, roof form and features (stepped gables), porches, chimneys, and foundation and wall materials and finishes. The designation applies to the interior floor plans, circulation patterns and room volumes; interior historic features, finishes and trim, including but not limited to historic flooring, doors, and wood trim (door and window surrounds, baseboards, wood paneling, fire place mantels and surrounds, etc.); and historic decorative wall finishes.

WHEREAS, in review of the application the Landmark Preservation Board FINDS:

II. Analysis of Proposal:

The criteria for designation as defined by the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Syracuse, Part C, Section VII, Article 5:

- Criterion 4: In the case of districts, possessing a unique overall quality of architectural scale, texture, form and visual homogeneity even though certain structures within the district may lack individual distinction;
- Criterion 5. In the case of interiors, possessing one (1) or more of the characteristics enumerated in 1, 2 or 3 above and, in addition, embodying distinctive characteristics of architectural scale, form and visual homogeneity, which are an integral part of the character of the structure in which the space is contained.

WHEREAS, the John Gridley House is one of only a small handful of buildings that remain from the frontier settlement period of Onondaga Hollow, which predates the City of Syracuse by more than 30 years; and

WHEREAS, the house was constructed in 1812 by masons Moses and Aaron Warner, who also constructed the Onondaga Arsenal, the original Valley Academy and the General Hutchinson House; and

WHEREAS, the house was constructed for local tanner John Gridley and his wife Nancy (Seely) Gridley, who lived in the house until 1832; and

WHEREAS, Dale and Ann Tussing, the 13th and current owners of the John Gridley House, have been outstanding stewards of the residence since 1969 and who have painstakingly restored many important interior and exterior features of the house; and

WHEREAS, the John Gridley House is an excellent example of Federal-period residential architecture in Onondaga County that retains an exceptional degree of integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association; and

WHEREAS, the John Gridley House was one of only three Syracuse buildings included in the 1936 Historic American Buildings Survey, the archives of which are located in the Library of Congress; and

WHEREAS, the John Gridley House was listed in the State and National Registers of Historic Places in 1977.

NOW THERFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the duly appointed members of the Landmark Preservation Board of the City of Syracuse, do this 4th day of June 2020, respond to the designation application of Dale and Ann Tussing, owners of 205 E. Seneca

Turnpike, pursuant to Part C, Section VII, Article 5 of the Zoning Rules and Regulations of the City of Syracuse in the following manner:

1) The Landmark Preservation Board recommends that the property located at 205 E. Seneca Turnpike, Syracuse, New York, 13205, be designated a Protected Site pursuant to its eligibility under Criteria 1, 2, 3 and 5 for the designation of Protected Sites under Article 5, and that the designation shall apply to the exterior and interior of the property as described above and in the Protected Site application.





	Exterior alterations include the following:

Exterior alterations: In 1936, the Historical American Building Survey report noted that the John Gridley House was "in good state of preservation, the owner taking great pride in keeping it so and in restoring it to what he believes it to have originally been." The report continued that the then current owner, Girard Parce, had removed a modern porch on the front of the house and that he intended to install a new six panel door "in duplication" of the former door. (Note: The current six-panel door was installed by the present owners, Ann and Dale Tussing.) It also noted that the side lights to the door were patterned from the sidelights originally on the Samuel Forman House at 405 W. Seneca Turnpike. The report also stated that Parce had raised the roof pitch from a one-to-two pitch to a one-to-three. The report noted that the rear porch was not original.

The original windows in the house were likely 12-over-12, double-hung sash. The current windows are 6-over-1, double-hung sash and appear to date to the late 19th-century. One potentially original,12-over12 window is located on the second floor of the rear façade and two of the kitchen windows have 12-over-1 double-hung sash.

The current owners, Ann and Dale Tussing, have kept meticulous records of the restoration and rehabilitation work that they have overseen since purchasing the house and site. (A summary list of repairs and other work is included in the project file.) Between 1969-71, they rebuilt the entire back porch including its stone supports. Evidence was found at that time indicating that the original porch was wider, running the full width of the house. In 1989, the Tussings built the current garage.

Interior alterations: The 1936 HABS report stated that an earlier owner (pre-1900) had changed the location and design of the stairs in the house to its current orientation. There is evidence that indicates that the interior stairs led from the kitchen directly up to what is now the southeast bedroom. The upstairs bedrooms were connected through interior doorways. In the late 1800s, the house was converted into a rooming house. In order to provide private access to the upstairs bedrooms, a center hallway was carved out of a portion of the second floor bedrooms and the staircase was reconfigured to its current position. The staircase is now accessed on the first floor through a set of French doors from the sitting room. In the 1950s, the northeast and southeast bedrooms were combined and turned into a small apartment unit, which included a private kitchen, bathroom and bedroom. The Tussings removed the upstairs kitchen in 1979. (Ann Tussing prepared a revised floor plan and notes about changes to the interior that have taken place since the HABS report, which is included in the project file.) In 1983, the Tussings expanded the kitchen by partially removing the wall between the kitchen and what was identified as the "library" in the HABS floor plans. The house features modern wiring, plumbing, and heating, the installation of which required enclosure of four original, shallow closets (though five remain, one with original pegs for hanging clothes, etc.). The basement plan was altered post-1936 to remove the cistern and install furnaces, a water heater, and stationary tubs. The Tussings restored the summer kitchen in 2005.

18. Interrelationship of structure/site and surroundings:

The John Gridley House is located on the north side of the 200 block of E. Seneca Turnpike in the Valley neighborhood of the city, formerly known as Onondaga Hollow. The 200 block of E. Seneca Turnpike is located at the base of a steep hill that rises to the east. To the west, the ground levels out into the original floodplain of Onondaga Creek. The immediate residential area surrounding the Gridley House consists of late-nineteenth to mid-twentieth-century frame houses with varying setbacks. The Gridley House is set back approximately 35 feet from the road on a level parcel. The front yard includes lawn area to either side of a stone front walk that leads from the city sidewalk to the front steps. There are planting beds at the base of the house and along the foundation on the east side of the house next to an asphalt driveway that is shared with the neighboring property. The driveway splits to the rear of the house leading to a single, story, gable-front frame, two-car garage. The neighboring house to the east was constructed approximately 40 feet from the Gridley House; the neighboring house to the west is located within 10 feet.

STRUCTURE / SITE SIGNIFICANCE

25. Exterior building features:

The John Gridley House is an imposing, two-story, Federal-style house with a raised foundation and a full attic. It was built 1812 of ashlar-cut Onondaga limestone with thin, light-colored mortar joints. The walls are 3' wide at the base and taper to 1.5' thick at the roof line. The side-gable roof features stepped parapet end gables with paired chimneys, one to each side of each center parapet. The roof is asphalt shingle.

The front façade is four-bays wide. The two western-most bays and the outside eastern-most bay include vertically aligned, single window openings on the first and second stories. The windows are 6-over-1, double-hung, wood sash with narrowly projecting stone sills and flush, flat-segmental arch stone lintels. The recessed entrance is located at the top of four, wide, stone steps. The entrance is framed by a dressed, stone arch with a decorative keystone design. The keystone is carved with a masonic symbol below a capital letter "G". Below the arch is a glass fanlight inset behind coffered, wood paneling. Below the fanlight, the six-panel, solid-wood door is recessed below a flat, projecting cornice with a decorative scalloped edge. The cornice is supported by four, fluted, thin wood, engaged columns which frame the center door and sidelights. Each column capital features a carved oval sunburst detail. The columns sit on rounded bases. The side lights to either side of the front door feature leaded glass tracery and sit on tall wood paneled bases. The second-story window above the entrance copies the general tri-partite division of the entrance below, featuring a large 6-over-1, double-hung sash window flanked by narrow double-hung vertical, 2-over-2 sash side lights. Each window is inset behind thin, paired, engaged columns that feature the same decorative capitals as the entranceway columns below. The window is inset under a flat stone sill and lintel.

The east and west facades are mirror images of each other, each facade featuring a single first and second story window opening. On the east façade the window openings are set to the right of the center of the façade and to the left of center on the west facade. The windows are 6-over-1, wood, double-hung sash with projecting sill and flush stone lintel. Below the first-floor window on each facade is a small recessed basement window with a 6-pane fixed sash. At the attic level on each facade, at the center of the parapet end is a single oval window with eight panes divided by wood muntins.

The rear façade features a 3/4-width, shed-roof porch across the first floor located at the top of a set of wooden steps. The porch has open rafters and is supported on simple square posts. Below the porch is a below-grade basement entrance. The entrance door is deeply recessed behind plain wood paneling. To the right of the door are two window openings at foundation-level and to the left of the door is a single foundation-level window. The windows are each 6-over-1, double-hung, wood sash with plain stone lintels and sills.

The rear entrance, which is vertically aligned with the basement entrance below, is a half-light, wood, paneled door with two upper fixed transom lights. (The 1936 HABS drawings indicate a solid, 6-panel door.) To the right of the door is a single, 6-over-1, double-hung sash window. To the left of the door are two, 12-over-1, double-hung sash windows. Of these two windows, the window farthest from the door has a plain stone lintel and sill. The window closest to the door features a concrete lintel and sill, which indicates that it may be a later addition. The second-floor features only two window openings. The westernmost window features 6-over-1, wood, double-hung sash. The easternmost window features 12-over-12, double-hung, wood sash and is likely original to the construction of the house. Both windows feature flat stone lintels and sills.

26. Interior building features:

The ground floor consists of a large sitting room (southeast quadrant), parlor (southwest quadrant), dining room (northwest quadrant) and kitchen and bathroom (northeast quadrant). The front entrance enters directly into the large sitting room. A center staircase is located directly from the sitting room behind French doors.

The second story is arranged around the center hallway, which provides access to three upstairs bedrooms, a dressing room and bathroom. The two largest bedrooms are located at the southwest and northwest quadrants of the second story and are accessed off the west side of the hallway. The southeast bedroom is accessed at the top of the stair. It is narrower than the other bedrooms and is connected to the dressing room through a small bathroom. There is also a door to the dressing room from the hallway. A second bathroom is located at the northeast corner of the house and is only accessed from the hallway.

The basement includes the former summer kitchen featuring a large stone and brick fireplace with brick hearth and brick beehive bake oven. Three rooms lead off the summer kitchen and are used for storage, as a furnace room, a potting room and a laundry room.

Exceptional interior features include the exquisitely carved, Federal-period, neo-classically inspired wood trim found throughout the first and second floors including window and door surrounds. The arch-and-keystone motif on the exterior entrance is repeated in wood on the inside of the front entrance. This motif is mirrored again in the massive, carved lunette located above the parlor threshold to the sitting room. The lunette is supported on fluted pilasters with square capitals. The parlor, sitting room and dining room on the first floor as well as the three bedrooms on the second floor have fireplaces with delicately carved mantelpieces and wood surrounds, each one unique in design. The house retains its original pine plank floors and many period paneled doors with mortise and tenon construction.

In 2003, while removing wallpaper in the bedrooms, the present owners discovered the original stenciling on the walls. The pattern of the stenciling also exposed where original doorways were located prior to the rearrangement of the stairway. The owners repaired the walls and recreated the stenciling, leaving a portion of the original stenciling exposed. In 2018, more original stenciling was exposed in the upstairs hallway.

27. Historic and architectural significance:

As noted in the National Register nomination, the John Gridley House is one of a small handful of buildings that remain from the frontier settlement period of Onondaga Hollow, which predates the City of Syracuse by more than 30 years. Onondaga Hollow was founded at the junction of

Onondaga Creek and the Seneca Turnpike, which was an important east-west road in New York State at the time (Gobrecht).

John Gridley arrived in Onondaga Hollow from Massachusetts with his family in 1790. His future wife, Nancy Seely -- the daughter of Gideon Seely, a prominent a prominent civil engineer and surveyor-- arrived in Onondaga from Westchester County 1797 (Riehardt). In 1810, John and Nancy Gridley purchased 2 acres of land from George Kibbe for \$1400. The sale also included the rights to a nearby spring. Gridley, who was a tanner, likely piped water from the spring to his house and to his tannery that was also located on the property (Campbell). The current owners, Dale and Ann Tussing, discovered a section of period, hollowed-out wooden water pipe on the property, which appears to support this theory.

The house was completed by 1812 and the Gridleys lived in the house until the 1830s. Unfortunately, the tanning business did not survive, and the house was lost in a sheriff's sale in 1832. Gridley and his family left New York State for a new life in Lake County, Illinois where he passed away in 1872 (Chase). John Gridley's granddaughter, Toni Mann, sent the Tussings a copy of a poem written by John Gridley titled "Retrospective View" in which Gridley recounts in part his time in Syracuse and the loss of his business and the house (excerpted below):

I've seen the folly of my youth which riper years would now condemn
Too ambitious—that's the truth, to gain a rank 'mong wealthy men.

Prosperity I could not bear temptations were alluring, built up castles in the air, foundations unenduring.

Bought up sundry lots of lands with houses on to rent, to accommodate my laboring hands, all were bought with good intent.

Built an expensive house of stone, not counting on the cost, had all the money been my own, my friends would not have lost.

Hired money – bought up hides, and trusted out my leather, bad debts on hand were multiplied which proved my ruin altogether.

I estimated house and land, figured up the cost, Could not be sold for cash in hand, was 'bout as good as lost.

Most willingly I left the place, to seek a home far, far away. My injured friends I could not face, and feel contented there to stay.

According to the HABS documentation and deed information provided by Ann Tussing, the house passed from the Gridleys to John Taylor (Newark, NJ) in 1832 in the sheriff's sale. He sold it that

same year to Daniel Comstock. In 1836, the house was sold to William J. Cook and in 1842 to Edward T. Slocum. From the Slocum family the house passed to Mary Blanchard in 1903. In 1909, the Parce Family purchased the house. The Parce family owned the house until 1957, when it passed to Howard and Eunice Thomson. In 1966, William Gordon purchased the house. He was only in the house for two years before he moved to New York City. The house sat empty for nearly half a year before the current owners, Ann and Dale Tussing purchased the house in May of 1969. The Tussings came to Syracuse in 1958 for Dale Tussing to study economics at Syracuse University. He joined the faculty of the Department of Economics in 1962 and retired in 2008. Ann Tussing is a retired editor and teacher. The Tussings raised 5 children in the Gridley House.

The John Gridley House is an excellent example of a "turnpike step-gabled house" and the best, most intact example in the Syracuse area. The stonemasons Moses and Aaron Warner are the purported builders. The Warners also built the Onondaga Arsenal, the original Valley Academy and the General Hutchinson House (now the Inn of the Seasons) (Case). It was an unusually elegant house to be constructed in Onondaga Hollow in 1812. Outstanding Federal-period design features include the prominent step gables with oval windows in the gable ends; the richly detailed front entrance, which features a dressed stone arch above a semi-circular fanlight and leaded-glass sidelights, and decorative wood trim; and the equally decorative tripartite window located directly above the entrance. The classically inspired carved woodwork is carried on into the interior in the elegant window and door surrounds, large carved lunette in the parlor, and the decorative trim around six of the seven fireplaces.

The Gridley House was one of only three Syracuse buildings included in the 1935 Historic American Buildings Survey and measured drawings of the house are in the Library of Congress. The property was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1977.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TRAFFIC CODE OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE TO ADD A NEW ARTICLE XXIII - "AMNESTY PROGRAM 2020" WHICH AUTHORIZES THE COMMISSIONER OF FINANCE TO INSTITUTE AN AMNESTY PROGRAM FOR UNPAID PARKING TICKETS ISSUED BY THE SYRACUSE POLICE DEPARTMENT

WHEREAS, there exists a number of unpaid parking tickets issued by the Syracuse Police Department; and

WHEREAS, the penalties on said unpaid parking tickets have accumulated in many instances, thereby making it increasingly difficult to pay the same; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Finance proposes an Amnesty Program which would establish a period in which delinquent penalties would be forgiven in consideration of payment of outstanding unpaid parking ticket fine/s and the New York State surcharge;

NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, the Traffic Code of the City of Syracuse is amended to add a new Article XXIII Amnesty Program 2020 to read as follows:

ARTICLE XXIII. AMNESTY PROGRAM

Sec. 15-419. Program instituted.

The commissioner of finance is hereby authorized to institute an amnesty program upon the following conditions:

A. *Term.* The period of amnesty will commence on September 8, 2020 and terminate on September 25, 2020. Amnesty requests must be received during the period of amnesty to be considered for inclusion in the Amnesty Program.

B. *Qualifications*. All outstanding unpaid traffic parking tickets issued by any public servant, police officer or member of the police department prior to September 8, 2020 for which a civil judgment has not been entered nor which have been included in a bankruptcy proceeding may be paid during the amnesty period to obtain penalty forgiveness. Parking tickets for which civil judgment has been entered may be considered for eligibility under the

Amnesty Program at the discretion of the commissioner of finance.

- C. Amnesty payment. The amnesty payment required in order to qualify for the amnesty program shall be equal to the unpaid outstanding parking tickets issued prior to September 8, 2020 and payment of the related New York surcharges thereto.
- D. *Penalties forgiven*. The commissioner of finance is authorized to accept the amnesty payment and discharge the outstanding unpaid parking tickets covered by the amnesty payment without payment of penalties.
- E. *Method of payment*. The Amnesty payment may be made at the drop box on the Market Street side of City Hall, by mail, by phone, or online, as designated by the commissioner of finance.

All outstanding unpaid traffic parking tickets issued by any public servant, police officer or member of the police department prior to September 8, 2020 for which a civil judgment has not been entered nor which have been included in a bankruptcy proceeding may be paid during the amnesty period to obtain penalty forgiveness. Parking tickets for which civil judgment has been entered may be considered for eligibility under the Amnesty Program at the discretion of the commissioner of finance.
- C. Amnesty payment. The amnesty payment required in order to qualify for the amnesty program shall be equal to the unpaid outstanding parking tickets issued prior to September 8, 2020 and payment of the related New York surcharges thereto.
- D. *Penalties forgiven*. The commissioner of finance is authorized to accept the amnesty payment and discharge the outstanding unpaid parking tickets covered by the amnesty payment without payment of penalties.

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF SYRACUSE TO ACCEPT, OWN, AND MAINTAIN THE LINING OF THREE (3) SEWER MANHOLES AND THE REPLACEMENT OF THEIR FRAMES AND COVERS THAT ARE BEING INSTALLED ALONG THE 200 AND 300 BLOCKS OF BURT STREET BY SALINA 1ST,LLAS PART OF THE SALINA 1ST PROJECT (1081 SOUTH SALINA STREET) IN ORDER TO COMPLY WITH ONONDAGA COUNTY'S 1:1 OFFSET REQUIREMENT (LOCAL LAW NO. 1-2011) AT NO COST TO THE CITY

WHEREAS, Salina 1st, LLC, the owner of the Salina 1st Project at 1081 South Salina Street, Syracuse, New York has requested that the City of Syracuse accept, own and maintain the lining of three (3) sewer manholes and the replacement frames and covers which shall be located along the 200 and 300 blocks of Burt Street as designated by the City Engineer in order to comply with the Onondaga County's 1:1 offset requirement (Local Law No. 1-2011); and

WHEREAS, the Department of Engineering has reviewed, coordinated with other City departments and is of the opinion that the installed facilities described in the plans and specifications on file at the Office of the City Engineer are to the benefit of the public and will not interfere with the public use of the streets; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, upon the recommendation of the City Engineer that this Common Council authorizes the permitting the Department of Public Works to accept own and maintain the above described infrastructure improvements constructed in the City Right of Way's by Salina 1st, LLC, as part of the Onondaga County's 1:1 offset requirement as shown on the plans

as forwarded to the Department of Engineering prepared for Salina 1st, LLC by RZ Engineering, PLLC and titled "Offset Sewer Plan", dated July 22, 2020, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The Owner shall construct, without cost to the City, and in accordance with plans, specifications and final locations to be approved by the City Engineer, and the Commissioner of Public Works, the lining and replacement of frames & covers of three sewer manholes along the 200 and 300 block of Burt Street which are the subjects of this action.
- 2. That traffic shall be maintained at all times during construction. The entire excavation of said work is to be protected by suitable guards and signal both by day and night and precautions are to be taken by all reasonable means to prevent any accident or injury while the work is in progress.
- 3. That said applicant, its successors or assigns, shall within thirty (30) days from the adoption of this Ordinance execute and file in the Office of the City Clerk written acceptance of this permission and consent.
- 4. That all ordinances, rules and regulations of the City and its departments shall at all time be complied with including the Building Code of the City of Syracuse.
- 5. The Work shall be subject to street cut and repair permitting process administered by the Commissioner of Public Works and any other standard permitting processes that exist. Restoration of pavement and sidewalks shall be completed in accordance with all City of Syracuse standards and as ordered by the City Engineer.
- 6. That the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works shall be advised in advance of time when the work is to be done and the work of installation, including shoring, protection of pipes and facilities and other safety measures, shall be subject to the supervision of the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works.
- 7. All work shall be done in a skillful manner with reasonable dispatch and in accordance with plans and specifications and all conditions imposed by any laws, rules or regulations which may apply to the work. A dust and sediment and erosion control program shall be in effect for the duration of the project to prevent a nuisance and to prevent interference with or damage to adjacent property, streets, sewers and drainage courses.
- 8. That Salina 1st, LLC shall adequately and properly protect any existing underground utilities located within or near said installation. If any such property or facilities are interfered with or damaged, Salina 1st, LLC, or its successors and assigns, shall be responsible for replacement to the satisfaction of the City Engineer. Should the City Engineer determine that City facilities or utilities require relocation, temporary support or other modification as a result of this Work, said modifications shall be made as directed by the City Engineer.

- 9. That Salina 1st, LLC, its successors, assigns, and agents shall obtain and keep in force until for the duration of this permission, a general liability insurance policy, in the amount of \$2,000,000, naming the City of Syracuse as an additional insured. A Certificate of said insurance, along with the declaration page and/or blanket endorsement page confirming that the City of Syracuse is an additional insured, shall be submitted to the City Engineer, 233 E. Washington Street, Room 401 City Hall, Syracuse, New York 13202.
- 10. That Salina 1st, LLC, assigns, and agents shall at all times defend and indemnify and save harmless the City of Syracuse, its officers and servants from any and all liability and from any and all claims, damages, costs and expenses of every name and nature to person or property which may accrue or grow out of the construction of such Work in said streets, and shall defend and indemnify and save harmless said City from all costs, damages and expenses by reason of any damages or injuries to any gas pipe, water pipe, sewers, other utilities, pipes or construction work now located in, under and along the surface of said street at the point and place or places where said work is to be performed.
- 11. The foregoing conditions may be modified or expanded from time to time as agreed upon by the Corporation Counsel, City Engineer and Salina 1st, LLC.
- 12. The construction and restoration permitted by the terms of this ordinance must be carried out and completed within two (2) years from the date of its adoption.
- 13. All monuments shall be referenced prior to construction. If any monuments are disturbed or moved, the monuments shall be replaced in the same location and recertified by a licensed surveyor to the City of Syracuse. All expenses for the above shall be paid for by Salina 1st, LLC.
- 14. Follow all weather and seasonal limitations per City/NYSDOT specifications for all construction in the City R.O.W. By consequence of the ordinance or subsequent approvals authorized by the ordinance, the City of Syracuse makes no representation, express or implied, as to the feasibility of the proposed plans or Work or to the extent of Work involved in accommodating any existing utility or facility located within the City rights-of-way. Any coordination with the various utility operators, private and/or public, is the responsibility of Salina 1st, LLC. Upon completion of the facilities and acceptance and approval of the improvements by the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works, the use, operation and maintenance of the sewer manholes shall revert to the City.
- 15. The City reserves the right to reject any and all materials or workmanship of the planned work that do not conform with the approved design drawings and specifications at any time during construction.
- 16. The City shall be notified, consulted and prior approval obtained on all field changes/field change sheets, RFI's etc. related to the work of this approval.

- 17. Salina 1st, LLC shall provide full-time consultant engineering inspection during the lining of the sewer manholes to be accepted by the City of Syracuse. The Consultant Inspector and the contractor shall have experience in lining sewer manholes in the public R.O.W. The Consultant shall keep daily inspection records and provide them to the City of Syracuse. All construction and inspection documentation including but not limited to shop drawings, pre and post TV inspection logs and digital copies of the videos, and asbuilt drawings shall be handed over to the City for their review and approval prior to the City's acceptance of the work.
- 18. Prior to acceptance of any construction to be handed over to the City, the independent Inspector and the City shall inspect the lined sewer manholes. The contractor shall then complete all items on the punch list.
- 19. The completed work shall be subject to approval by the Commissioner of Public Works and the City Engineer, and Salina 1st, LLC shall warranty the same for two (2) years from the date of acceptance.
- 20. I request the following legislation for the next meeting of the Common Council be prepared:

An Ordinance authorizing the City of Syracuse to Accept the lining of three sewer manholes and the replacement of their frames and covers by Salina 1st, LLC, the owner of the Salina 1st project (1081 South Salina Street) at No Cost to the City. The three sewer manholes to be lined and the frames & covers replaced shall be located along the 200 and 300 block of Burt Street. This is a result of the Onondaga County's 1:1 offset requirement (Local Law No.1, 2011).

This department has reviewed, coordinated with other City departments and is of the opinion that the installed facilities described in the plans and specifications on file at the City Engineer's office are to the benefit of the public use of the streets. It is therefore, recommended that an ordinance be submitted for consideration by the Common Council permitting the Department of Public Works to accept own and maintain the above described infrastructure improvements constructed in the City Right of Way's by Salina 1st, LLC, as part of the Onondaga County's 1:1 offset requirement as shown on the plans as forwarded to the Department of Engineering prepared for SALINA 1ST, LLC by RZ Engineering, PLLC and titled "Offset Sewer Plan", dated July 22, 2020.

 The Owner shall construct, without cost to the City, and in accordance with plans, specifications and final locations to be approved by the City Engineer, and the Commissioner of Public Works, the lining and replacement of frames & covers of three sewer manholes along the 200 and 300 block of Burt Street which are the subjects of this action.

- 2. That traffic shall be maintained at all times during construction. The entire excavation of said work is to be protected by suitable guards and signal both by day and night and precautions are to be taken by all reasonable means to prevent any accident or injury while the work is in progress.
- 3. That said applicant, its successors or assigns, shall within thirty (30) days from the adoption of this Ordinance execute and file in the Office of the City Clerk written acceptance of this permission and consent.
- 4. That all ordinances, rules and regulations of the City and its departments shall at all time be complied with including the Building Code of the City of Syracuse.
- 5. The Work shall be subject to street cut and repair permitting process administered by the Commissioner of Public Works and any other standard permitting processes that exist. Restoration of pavement and sidewalks shall be completed in accordance with all City of Syracuse standards and as ordered by the City Engineer.
- 6. That the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works shall be advised in advance of time when the work is to be done and the work of installation, including shoring, protection of pipes and facilities and other safety measures, shall be subject to the supervision of the City Engineer and the Commissioner of Public Works.
- 7. All work shall be done in a skillful manner with reasonable dispatch and in accordance with plans and specifications and all conditions imposed by any laws, rules or regulations which may apply to the work. A dust and sediment and erosion control program shall be in effect for the duration of the project to prevent a nuisance and to prevent interference with or damage to adjacent property, streets, sewers and drainage courses.
- 8. That Salina 1st, LLC shall adequately and properly protect any existing underground utilities located within or near said installation. If any such property or facilities are interfered with or damaged, Salina 1st, LLC, or its successors and assigns, shall be responsible for replacement to the satisfaction of the City Engineer. Should the City Engineer determine that City facilities or utilities require relocation, temporary support or other modification as a result of this Work, said modifications shall be made as directed by the City Engineer.
- 9. That Salina 1st, LLC, its successors, assigns, and agents shall obtain and keep in force until for the duration of this permission, a general liability insurance policy, in the amount of \$2,000,000, naming the City of Syracuse as an additional insured. A Certificate of said insurance shall be submitted to the Office of Corporation Counsel, 233 E. Washington Street, Room 300 City Hall, Syracuse, NY 13202.
- 10. That Salina 1st, LLC, assigns, and agents shall at all times defend and indemnify and save harmless the City of Syracuse, its officers and servants from any and all liability and from any and all claims,

damages, costs and expenses of every name and nature to person or property which may accrue or grow out of the construction of such Work in said streets, and shall defend and indemnify and save harmless said City from all costs, damages and expenses by reason of any damages or injuries to any gas pipe, water pipe, sewers, other utilities, pipes or construction work now located in, under and along the surface of said street at the point and place or places where said work is to be performed.

- 11. The foregoing conditions may be modified or expanded from time to time as agreed upon by the Corporation Counsel, City Engineer and Salina 1st, LLC.
- 12. The construction and restoration permitted by the terms of this ordinance must be carried out and completed within two (2) years from the date of its adoption.
- 13. All monuments shall be referenced prior to construction. If any monuments are disturbed or moved, the monuments shall be replaced in the same location and recertified by a licensed surveyor to the City of Syracuse. All expenses for the above shall be paid for by Salina 1st, LLC.
- 14. Follow all weather and seasonal limitations per City/NYSDOT specifications for all construction in the City R.O.W. By consequence of the ordinance or subsequent approvals authorized by the ordinance, the City of Syracuse makes no representation, express or implied, as to the feasibility of the proposed plans or Work or to the extent of Work involved in accommodating any existing utility or facility located within the City rights-of-way. Any coordination with the various utility operators, private and/or public, is the responsibility of Salina 1st, LLC. Upon completion of the facilities and acceptance and approval of the improvements by the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works, the use, operation and maintenance of the sewer manholes shall revert to the City.
- 15. The City reserves the right to reject any and all materials or workmanship of the planned work that do not conform with the approved design drawings and specifications at any time during construction.
- 16. The City shall be notified, consulted and prior approval obtained on all field changes/field change sheets, RFI's etc. related to the work of this approval.
- 17. Salina 1st, LLC shall provide full-time consultant engineering inspection during the lining of the sewer manholes to be accepted by the City of Syracuse. The Consultant Inspector and the contractor shall have experience in lining sewer manholes in the public R.O.W. The Consultant shall keep daily inspection records and provide them to the City of Syracuse. All construction and inspection documentation including but not limited to shop drawings, pre and post TV inspection logs and digital copies of the videos, and as-built drawings shall be handed over to the City for their review and approval prior to the City's acceptance of the work.

- 18. Prior to acceptance of any construction to be handed over to the City, the independent Inspector and the City shall inspect the lined sewer manholes. The contractor shall then complete all items on the punch list.
- 19. The completed work shall be subject to approval by the Commissioner of Public Works and the City Engineer, and Salina 1st, LLC shall warranty the same for two (2) years from the date of acceptance.
- 20. Failure or refusal of the Salina 1st, LLC to complete the work as required by this ordinance shall result in City of Syracuse holding the temporary certificate of occupancy and the certificate of occupancy for the Salina 1st Project located at 1081 South Salina Street until the work is complete.

Additional terms and conditions, as recommended by the City Engineer and the Corporation Counsel, shall be set forth in the Ordinance.

BOND ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$200,000.00) TO DEFRAY THE COST AND EXPENSE OF THE CITY HALL AND CITY HALL COMMONS SPACE ASSESSMENT AND SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Common Council of the City of Syracuse as follows:

Section 1. For the specific object or purpose of providing funds to defray the cost and expense of the City Hall and City Hall Commons Space Assessment and Security Improvements Project, which will include the installation of a single point of entry for City Hall and City Hall Commons; installation of walk through metal detectors, handheld metal detectors, an infrared thermal scanning system, and wireless locksets on doors within City Hall to all Departments, in order to enhance the health and safety measures for all those entering these facilities, at a cost not to exceed Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00), general obligation bonds of the City of Syracuse, to be of the terms, form and contents hereinafter provided for, are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York.

Section 2. Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) is estimated as the maximum cost of the specific object or purpose for which such bonds are to be issued.

Section 3. The plan for financing such specific object or purpose consists of the issuance and sale of bonds of the City of Syracuse in the principal sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00), thereby providing such sum for all the maximum cost of such specific object or purpose.

Section 4. It is hereby determined that the specific object or purpose for which bonds are to

be issued falls within subdivision 32 of paragraph (a) Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law and the period of probable usefulness of such specific object or purpose is five (5) years.

Section 5. The Commissioner of Finance, not more than fifteen (15) days and not less than three (3) days before the sale of said bonds, shall file with the Comptroller of the State of New York a supplemental debt statement and file a duplicate thereof with the City Clerk in compliance with Section 109.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Commissioner of Finance who is the chief fiscal officer of the City under the Local Finance Law. The Commissioner of Finance may sell such bonds at public or private sale, with or without bond insurance or other credit enhancement, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine is most favorable to said City, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Commissioner of Finance, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Commissioner of Finance is hereby authorized to issue variable rate debt, acquire credit support, and enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds, as authorized under Sections 54.90 and 168.00 of the Local Finance Law. Said bonds shall be signed in the name of the City by the original or facsimile signature of the Mayor and countersigned by the original or facsimile signature of the Commissioner of Finance and sealed with the original or facsimile corporate seal of the City, provided, however, that if the signatures of the Mayor and the Commissioner of Finance are each by facsimile signatures on any bond, such bond shall be authenticated by the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent of the City. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds (and if said bonds are to be executed in the name of the City by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the City), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Commissioner of Finance. The Commissioner of Finance may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds, or may contract on behalf of the City for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Commissioner of Finance shall determine. The Commissioner of Finance may also agree on behalf of the City to provide or disclose such information about the City as may be necessary to enable the purchasers of bonds or notes of the City to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12.

Section 7. The temporary use of available funds of the City of Syracuse, not immediately required for the purpose or purposes for which the same were raised or otherwise created, is hereby authorized pursuant to Section 165.10 of the Local Finance Law, for the capital purposes described in Section 1 of this ordinance. The reasonably expected source of funds to be used to initially pay for the expenditures authorized by Section 1 of this resolution shall be from the

City's Capital Fund. It is intended that the City shall then reimburse expenditures from the Capital Fund with the proceeds of the bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized by this ordinance and that the interest payable on the bonds and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of such bonds shall be excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. This ordinance is intended to constitute the declaration of the City's "official intent" within the meaning of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 to reimburse the expenditures authorized by this ordinance with the proceeds of the bonds and bond anticipation notes authorized herein. Other than as specified in this ordinance, no monies are reasonably expected to be received, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 8. When said bonds and notes shall have been duly sold, the same shall be delivered by the Commissioner of Finance to the purchaser upon payment to him of the purchase price, including accrued interest, and the receipt of the Commissioner of Finance shall be a full acquittance to such purchaser who shall not be obliged to see to the application of the purchase money.

Section 9. The faith and credit of the City of Syracuse are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal of said bonds and interest thereon when due. An amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said bonds as the same becomes due each year shall be included in the annual budget of said City for the year.

Section 10. The validity of the bonds hereby authorized may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the City of Syracuse is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this ordinance are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding

contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 11. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Highway Law §10 (23, 24 and/or 27) the Commissioner of Transportation (the "Commissioner"), may at the expense of the state, or using federal funds, and/or using local funds provide for the installation and or replacement of street lighting systems, provided the Commissioner deems it practicable to perform such work for such Municipality/Sponsor in connection with the performance of any work of construction, reconstruction or improvement under the Highway Law; and
WHEREAS, the COMMISSIONER proposes to install and replace lighting a State Highway pursuant to the New York State Highway Law, such highway being identified as Interstate 690 the State Highway (S.H.) 570 in Onondaga County within the geographical jurisdiction of the City Municipality and geographical jurisdiction of City of Syracuse in the County of Onondaga; and
WHEREAS, the MUNICIPALITY desires to have lighting system installed and removed on or along such highway within the geographical jurisdiction of the MUNICIPALITY; and
WHEREAS, it is recognized by the MUNICIPALITY and the COMMISSIONER that if the MUNICIPALITY desires to have lighting system installed on or along such highway within the geographical jurisdiction of the MUNICIPALITY, the MUNICIPALITY shall maintain, repair and energize such lighting system at its own expense; and
WHEREAS, the MUNICIPALITY by Resolution No. # adopted at the City of Syracuse Common Council meeting held on, approved the installation and replace maintenance and energizing of said lighting and has provided such Resolution hereto, and has

further authorized the **Ben Walsh**, **Mayor** to execute this Agreement on behalf of the MUNICIPALITY; and

WHEREAS, the City of Syracuse and the COMMISSIONER are desirous of identifying the respective responsibilities of the parties with regard to the highway lighting system;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and benefits moving to the parties, it is agreed as follows:

ARTICLE 1: DOCUMENTS FORMING THIS AGREEMENT. The parties agree that the Agreement consists of the following:

- a. Agreement: This document, entitled "Agreement for Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Energizing of Lighting System for State highway identified as" PJ-LOC [See above];
- b. Schedule "A" Description of Project, funding and deposit requirements:
- c. Appendix "A" Standard Clauses for New York State Contracts;
- d. Appendix A-1: Supplemental Title VI Provisions (Civil Rights Act);
- e. Municipal Resolution(s): duly adopted resolution authorizing this agreement and the appropriate municipal office to execute the Agreement and undertake the project on the terms and conditions set forth herein.

ARTICLE 2: PROJECT RESPONSIBILITIES.

- 2.1 The COMMISSIONER shall provide for the furnishing and placing of the following items in connection with a lighting system on the above-mentioned highway and identified in the contract documents for this transportation project:
 - a. Underground duct system, including conduit, pull boxes, handholds, and drainage pockets.
 - b. Ducts, pull boxes, and anchor bolts on structures.
 - c. Foundation for light standards, concrete pads and meter boxes.
 - d. Light standards and bracket arms.
 - e. photo-electric switches, switches and all other components necessary to complete the lighting system.
 - f. Luminaires and wiring

All of the above-identified items shall be and continue to be the property of the State of New York.

- 2.2 Upon completion of construction of the above identified highway project, the MUNICIPALITY shall, at its own expense, maintain the lighting system installed under such highway project within the geographical jurisdiction of the MUNICIPALITY. Such maintenance shall include, but not be limited to:
 - a. Repair of equipment which may be damaged from any cause whatsoever.
 - b. Replacement of equipment which may be non-functioning or damaged from any cause whatsoever, such replacement material to be of equal character to the original equipment.
 - c. Payment for delivery and supply of the electric current for the lighting system during the customary night hours [dusk to dawn] of each day of the year, at no cost or obligation to the STATE.

d. Should MUNICIPALITY choose to install lighting attached to a utility pole(s) belonging to Utility Company, the STATE shall not be involved and MUNICIPALITY shall make appropriate Pole Attachment Agreement and payment arrangements with the respective Utility Company.

ARTICLE 3: TERM OF AGREEMENT.

- 3.1 This Agreement shall commence upon **MONTH, DAY, YEAR** and–shall expire upon **MONTH, DAY, YEAR** (the date twenty-five (25) years thereafter). The MUNICIPALITY shall continue to maintain and energize the lighting system for the period of its useful life or until such time as the COMMISSIONER, at his/her discretion, in agreement with MUNICIPALITY, determines that such lighting and/or the maintenance of such lighting system is no longer warranted or desired for such State HAI [for: Highway, Arterial, or Interstate: choose], and sets forth action to remove such lighting system at the MUNICIPALITY's expense.
- 3.2 The MUNICIPALITY agrees not to assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this Agreement or any part thereof, or its right, title, or interest therein, or its power to execute this Agreement to any person, company or corporation without COMMISIONER's written consent. MUNICIPALITY shall express their desire to change the terms of this Agreement in writing to the COMMISSIONER, except as herein provided by Municipal Resolution attached hereto.
- 3.3 The COMMISSIONER herewith extends his/her consent to the MUNICIPALITY to establish a lighting district to transfer the MUNICIPALITY's cost for repair, maintenance of the lighting system, and to ensure that payments are made to Utility Company for delivery and supply of energy.

ARTICLE 4. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.

- 4.1. Prior to the expiration of the Agreement, the MUNICIPALITY shall review the Agreement and determine whether it desires to continue maintaining said lighting system. If at any time after the useful life of the lighting system the MUNICIPALITY, in its discretion, determines that it does not desire to maintain said lighting system, it shall notify the COMMISSIONER or his/her representative in writing.
- 4.2. During the duration of this Agreement, where the MUNICIPALITY has no desire to maintain the lighting system, and / or discontinues payment for the energizing of the lighting system covered in this Agreement, said fixtures will be removed by the STATE at the expense of the MUNICIPALITY, unless the STATE has funds available to maintain, repair and energize said lighting system, and the COMMISSIONER, in his/her discretion, determines that such lighting system is warranted or desired for such State Highway. Upon written notification by the COMMISSIONER of the removal cost, the MUNICIPALITY shall, within 90 days of the receipt of such written notification from the COMMISSIONER, reimburse the STATE the amount specified. The cost of removal includes but is not limited to review and upgrading of roadway delineation features, including pavement markings, and any and all penalties, fees and/or other costs for unamortized fixtures which the STATE is required to pay the Federal Government.

ARTICLE 5: REMEDIES

5.1. Should the MUNICIPALITY, within the term of this Agreement and without the prior written consent of the COMMISSIONER, discontinue the repairs and maintenance, and/or discontinue payment for energizing the lighting system covered in this Agreement, which results in the STATE being required to make payment to the Federal Government, as a penalty or otherwise, the MUNICIPALITY, upon written notification by the COMMISSIONER of such

requirement to pay, shall reimburse the STATE the amount of such required payment within 90 days of the receipt of such written notification from the COMMISSIONER.

- **5.2.** Further, it is expressly understood that the MUNICIPALITY shall indemnify and save harmless the STATE from claims, suits, actions, damages and costs of every name and description resulting from the discontinuance of the repairs and maintenance, and/or discontinuance of payment for energizing of the lighting system by the MUNICIPALITY.
- 5.3. The COMMISSIONER or his/her representative may periodically inspect the lighting system installed under the above-identified Construction Project to ascertain that the lighting system is being maintained and energized in accordance with the terms of this Agreement and in condition satisfactory to the COMMISSIONER. The COMMISSIONER shall, in writing, notify the MUNICIPALITY of any observed deficiencies, listing such deficiencies. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of such notification by MUNICIPALITY, the COMMISSIONER or his/her representative shall arrange for a meeting to be held with the authorized representative of the MUNICIPALITY. At such meeting the COMMISSIONER or his/her representative and the authorized representative of the MUNICIPALITY shall discuss the means required to remedy the noted deficiencies. Based on the discussion, and based on the nature of the required remedial action, a reasonable time limit shall be mutually established by the COMMISSIONER or his/her representative and the authorized representative of the MUNICIPALITY for the satisfactory completion of remedial action by the MUNICIPALITY.
- **5.4.** It is recognized by the parties hereto that failure of the MUNICIPALITY to complete the required remedial actions within the agreed upon time limit may subject the MUNICIPALITY to certain penalties. If the equipment supplied and installed by the STATE for the above subject lighting system was done pursuant to a Federally aided and/or Federally reimbursable contract, and the MUNICIPALITY fails to make the remedial actions within the agreed upon time limit, no further Federally aided project shall be approved for the MUNICIPALITY until such time as the said lighting system is restored to the level and condition required by this Agreement. In addition, failure of the MUNICIPALITY to make such remedial actions may subject the MUNICIPALITY to loss of State aid for other future municipal contracts.

ARTICLE 6: NOTICE REQUIREMENTS

- 6.1 All notices permitted or required hereunder shall be in writing and shall be transmitted either:
 - i. Via certified or registered United States mail, return receipt requested;
 - ii. By personal delivery;
 - iii. By expedited delivery service; or
 - iv. By e-mail.

6.2 Any such notice shall be deemed to have been given either at the time of delivery or, in the case of expedited delivery service or certified or registered US mail, as of the date of first attempted delivery at the address and in the manner provided herein, or in the case of facsimile transmission by e-mail, upon request.

6.3 The parties may, from time to time, specify any new or different address in the United States as their address for purpose of receiving notice under this Agreement by giving fifteen (15) days written notice to the other party sent in accordance herewith. The parties agree to mutually designate individuals as their respective representatives for the purposes of receiving notices under this Agreement. Additional individuals may be designated in writing by the parties for the purposes of implementation and administration/billing, resolving issues and problems, and/or for dispute resolution.

ARTICLE 7: PROCESSING OF BETTERMENT DEPOSITS AND PAYMENTS

- 7.1 NYSDOT will install, remove, relocate, replace and/or reconstruct the MUNICIPAL facilities in accordance with plans and specifications related thereto, as they may be amended or revised, and subject to such change orders as may be approved by NYSDOT in connection with its administration of the work and other work under the Construction Contract for or relating to the work under this Agreement.
- 7.2 For all Betterment work done by NYSDOT, the MUNICIPALITY shall, prior to the work being done, deposit in a project escrow account with the Office of State Comptroller the full amount of the MUNICIPAL share (if any) reflected in the itemized engineer's estimated cost of the work to be performed on MUNICIPAL facilities for payments by the Comptroller on account of Project costs. The excess amount of such deposit shall be reimbursed to the MUNICIPALITY after project close out, unless Fixed Price Lump Sum project share is established.
- 7.3 Payments to the Contractor for Betterment work shall be made using State Comptroller vouchers or requisitions approved by the COMMISSIONER.
- 7.4 When Betterment work performed on the MUNICIPAL facilities contemplated herein has been completed, and all payments have been made to the Contractor, the COMMISSIONER shall determine the additional costs thereof to be borne by the MUNICIPALITY. Any excess of the deposit shall be returned to the MUNICIPALITY on the warrant of the State Comptroller or using vouchers approved by the COMMISSIONER; and, in the event such costs exceed the amount of the deposit, the COMMISSIONER shall send a written notice to the MUNICIPALITY requesting such extra payment be deposited with the Office of State Comptroller in a project escrow account. The MUNICIPALITY shall, within 90 days of receipt of such written notice from the COMMISSIONER, pay the amount of such deficiency to the Office of State Comptroller, unless Fixed Price Lump Sum project share has been established.

BE IT ORDAINED, that Ordinance No. 560-2018 as last amended by Ordinance No. 668-2019 is hereby amended to read as follows:

WHEREAS, the Syracuse City School District has requested permission to fuel cars and pick-up trucks owned by the Syracuse City School District and/or used by Syracuse City School District officers and employees in the course of their employment responsibilities at the City Department of Public Works Fuel Facility; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Public Works has determined that the City Fuel Facility located at the Department of Public Works is capable of handling the additional fuel required to carry out the terms of the agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Syracuse City School District has agreed to reimburse the City for the cost of fuel (including compressed natural gas), plus a \$.06 administrative fee per gallon, and all costs associated with the addition of Syracuse City School District vehicles to the City's computerized fuel handling system including paying the charge for gas keys based on the actual cost to the City plus a five percent (5%) administrative charge for personnel identification numbers, which is necessary whenever a new or lost key is issued; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, that the Mayor, on behalf of the City of Syracuse, is hereby authorized to enter into a municipal cooperation agreement with the Syracuse City School District ("SCSD") in relation to the use of the City of Syracuse Public Works Fuel Facility by cars and pick-up trucks owned by the SCSD and/or used by SCSD officers and employees in the course of their employment responsibilities, with (1) all the costs of vehicle gas keys and personnel identification

BE IT ORDAINED, that the Mayor, on behalf of the City of Syracuse, is hereby authorized to enter into a municipal cooperation agreement with the Syracuse Housing Authority in relation to the provision of white road salt for use by the Syracuse Housing Authority from the City's Department of Public Works facility at the City's actual cost per ton (2016/17 rate per ton was \$48.81) plus a \$5.00 per ton administrative fee; the municipal cooperation agreement with the Syracuse Housing Authority is hereby extended for the first one-year renewal period for the 2017/18 winter season at the City's actual cost per ton (2017/18 rate per ton was \$42.29) plus a

\$5.00 per ton administrative fee; the municipal cooperation agreement with the Syracuse Housing Authority is hereby extended for the second one-year renewal period for the 2018/19 winter season at the City's actual cost per ton (2018/19 current rate of \$42.29 per ton) plus a \$5.00 per ton administrative fee for a total cost of \$47.29 per ton; the municipal cooperation agreement with the Syracuse Housing Authority is hereby extended for the third one-year renewal period for the 2019/20 winter season at the City's actual cost per ton (2019/20 current rate of \$47.83 per ton) plus a \$5.00 per ton administrative fee for a total cost of \$52.83 per ton; the municipal cooperation agreement with the Syracuse Housing Authority is hereby extended for the third one-year renewal period for the 2019/20 winter season at the City's actual cost per ton (2019/20 current rate of \$47.83 per ton) plus a \$5.00 per ton administrative fee for a total cost of \$52.83 per ton; the municipal cooperation agreement with the Syracuse Housing Authority is hereby extended for the fourth one-year renewal period for the 2020/2021 winter season at the City's actual cost per ton (2020/2021 current rate of \$38.79 per ton) plus a \$5.00 per ton administrative fee for a total cost of \$43.79 per ton; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the City's Commissioner of Public Works shall administer the system so as to provide for coordination and scheduling of use of the facility which will accommodate the provision of white road salt for City and the Syracuse Housing Authority and Syracuse Housing Authority shall at all times provide its own vehicles for receipt and transportation of the white road salt; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the City shall not be responsible for the white road salt supply or lack thereof for reasons beyond the City's control, including but not limited to strike, white road salt shortage, or late deliveries from suppliers of white road salt; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the term of the agreement shall be for one year commencing on or about November 1, 2016 through April 30, 2017, with the option of four additional one-year renewal periods subject to the approval of the Mayor and Common Council, and further that either the City or Syracuse Housing Authority may, notwithstanding the term of the contract, terminate this contract at any time upon thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party, provided that all costs and expenses due or accruing under such agreement shall be promptly paid on or prior to the date of termination; this agreement is hereby extended for the first one-year renewal period commencing on or about November 1, 2017 through April 30, 2018, with the option of three (3) additional one-year renewal periods subject to the approval of the Mayor and Common Council; same termination provisions shall apply to the renewal period; this agreement is hereby extended for the second one-year renewal period commencing on or about November 1, 2018 through April 30, 2019, with the option of two (2) additional one-year renewal periods subject to the approval of the Mayor and Common Council; same termination provisions shall apply to the renewal period; this agreement is hereby extended for the third one-year renewal period commencing on or about November 1, 2019 through April 30, 2020, with the option of one (1) additional one-year renewal period subject to the approval of the Mayor and Common Council; same termination provisions shall apply to the renewal period; this agreement is hereby extended for the fourth one-year renewal period commencing on or about November 1, 2020 through April 30, 2021, same termination provisions shall apply to the renewal period; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this amended agreement shall be subject to the necessary approvals of Syracuse Housing Authority and copies of the approval shall be submitted to the Corporation Counsel; and

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING A VOLUNTARY EARLY RETIREMENT INCENTIVE PROGRAM FOR CITY OF SYRACUSE EMPLOYEES WHO ARE AGE 55 OR OLDER WITH TEN YEARS OF ACTIVE SERVICE WITH THE CITY OF SYRACUSE

BE IT ORDAINED, subject to the approval of the Mayor, that the Common Council hereby authorizes a voluntary early retirement incentive program for City of Syracuse employees, subject to the conditions set forth below:

- 1. Eligibility: All City of Syracuse employees who are age 55 or older with at least ten years of active service with the City of Syracuse as of December 31, 2020 ("Eligible Employees").
- 2. \$5,000 one-time incentive for Eligible Employees to elect to participate in the Voluntary Early Retirement Incentive Program. Such employees are responsible for all appropriate payroll taxes associated with the retirement incentive payment.
- 3. Eligible Employees who elect to participate in this Voluntary Early Retirement Incentive Program shall have their healthcare premiums frozen at the level they are paying as of the date this Ordinance is approved by the Mayor.
- 4 Eligible Employees who elect to participate in this Voluntary Early Retirement Incentive Program shall have the choice to defer pension payments until normal retirement age or another date of the Eligible Employee's choosing.
- 5. Period of Eligibility: The Voluntary Early Retirement Incentive Program will be effective as of the date this Ordinance is approved by the Mayor. The Office of Personnel and Labor Relations will provide all Eligible Employees with an application packet for the Voluntary Retirement Incentive Program. Upon receipt of the packet Eligible Employees will have forty-five

- (45) days to elect to participate in the program and return their completed application to the Office of Personnel and Labor Relations.
- 6. An Eligible Employee who completes the application to participate in the Voluntary Early Retirement Incentive Program shall have seven (7) days from the date the application is turned in to the Office of Personnel and Labor Relations in which to withdraw their application
- 7. Waiver of the Requirements of Section 11-43 (2) and (3) of Article 13 of Chapter 11 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse, as amended, entitled Retiree Eligibility: For the sole purpose of allowing Eligible Employees who elect to participate in the Voluntary Early Retirement Incentive Program authorized by this Ordinance to have the choice to defer pension payments until normal retirement age or another date of the Eligible Employee's choosing, the following provisions of Section 11-43 of Article 13 of Chapter 11 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse, as amended entitled Retiree Eligibility which state: "A city employee shall be eligible for retiree health insurance coverage if such city employee: ...(2) Is eligible for retirement under the applicable provisions of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law; and (3) Does retire from active service as a city employee with such pension...." are hereby waived. Outside of this ordinance the provisions of Section 11-43 of Article 13 of Chapter 11 of the Revised General Ordinances of the City of Syracuse, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect.
- 8. Pursuant to the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law and this ordinance, the incentive payment provided to Eligible Employees pursuant to this ordinance cannot be applied against base pay for the purposes of calculating final average salary and monthly pension payments.
 - 9. The Director of Management and Budget shall prepare and file with the New York

State Retirement System a list containing the names and social security numbers of all City of Syracuse employees who will be eligible for the retirement incentive authorized by this ordinance.

- 10. The retirement incentive program authorized by this ordinance shall be available to Eligible Employees who voluntarily elect to retire in accordance with its terms and shall not in any manner mandate the retirement of eligible employees of the City of Syracuse.
- 11. The actual payment of the \$5,000 retirement incentive to an Eligible Employee shall be made by the Commissioner of Finance following submission by such eligible member of all documentation required by this ordinance. Such payment shall be made either with the final payment of any sums due the Eligible Employee upon the termination of their employment or as a separate payment; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the expense of the early retirement program authorized herein shall be charged to an appropriate account as designated by the Commissioner of Finance.

Dear Mr. Copanas:

Please prepare legislation to be introduced at the next meeting of the Syracuse Common Council authorizing the creation of a temporary Voluntary Retirement Incentive Program (VRIP) for eligible City of Syracuse employees who are 55 years of age or older and who have completed a minimum of ten (10) years of active service with the City of Syracuse.

The VRIP will provide eligible City employees with three benefits: (1) a one-time bonus payment of \$5,000.00; (2) a freeze of retirement healthcare premiums at current levels; and (3) a choice to defer pension payments until normal retirement age or another time of the employee's choosing.

The legislation authorizing the VRIP shall include a waiver of the requirement outlined in City's General Ordinance No. 1-2007 Section 11-43 — Retiree eligibility that employees retiring directly from the City begin collecting a pension immediately in order to be eligible for retiree health insurance. This waiver is necessary to allow a retirement eligible employee to leave City service, delay their pension in order to remain in the workforce, and still receive ongoing retiree health insurance benefits.

The legislation should be revised to indicate the retirement incentive will not be forfeited if subsequent to retirement the individual enters or reenters public employment.

RESOLUTION **AUTHORIZING** THE AGENCY UNDERTAKE A PROJECT IN CONNECTION WITH LANDSCAPING SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED IN THE LAKEFRONT REDEVELOPMENT AREA FOR THE YEAR 2020 AND TO ENTER INTO A COOPERATION AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY WITH RESPECT THERETO

WHEREAS, the policy of the State of New York (the "State") set forth in Title 1 of Article 18-A of the General Municipal Law of the State, as amended (the "IDA Act"), is to promote the economic welfare, recreation opportunities and prosperity of its inhabitants and to actively promote, attract, encourage and develop recreation, economically sound commerce and industry through governmental action for the purpose of preventing unemployment and economic deterioration by the creation of industrial development agencies and to protect and promote the health of the inhabitants of the State and to increase trade through promoting the development of

facilities to provide recreation for the citizens of the State and to attract tourists from other states; and

WHEREAS, City of Syracuse Industrial Development Agency (the "Agency") constitutes an industrial development agency established under the IDA Act and Chapter 641 of the Laws of 1979 of the State of New York, as amended from time to time (together with the IDA Act, the "Act") and is thereby authorized and empowered to promote, develop, encourage and assist in the acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, improving, maintaining, equipping and furnishing of industrial, manufacturing, warehousing, commercial, research and recreation facilities, including industrial pollution control facilities, educational or cultural facilities, railroad facilities and certain horse racing facilities, thereby advance the job opportunities, health, general prosperity and economic welfare of the people of the State and improve their recreation opportunities, prosperity and standard of living; and

WHEREAS, to accomplish its stated purposes, the Agency is authorized and empowered under the Act to acquire, hold and dispose of personal property for its corporate purposes; with the consent of the municipality, to use agents, employees and facilities of the municipality and pay the municipality its agreed proportion of the compensation or costs therefor; to appoint officers, agents and employees and pay their compensation out of funds of the Agency; make contracts and leases; to use gifts, grants, loans or contributions for any of its corporate purposes; and to all things necessary or convenient to carry out its purposes and exercise the powers expressly given in the IDA Act; and

WHEREAS, the Agency received certain funds and other payments in lieu of taxes from one or more projects previously undertaken by the Agency where some or all of the monies were restricted (the "Restricted Funds") for use in the revitalization in and around the inner harbor and lakefront areas including but not limited to the Franklin Square area of the City of Syracuse (the "City") (collectively, the "Lakefront Redevelopment Area"); and

WHEREAS, the Agency has undertaken several projects in and around the Lakefront Redevelopment Area over the past several years and the Agency is interested in ensuring that the public grounds, including but not limited to, landscaping in the Lakefront Redevelopment Area is maintained (the "Work") to further promote the economic welfare, recreational opportunities and prosperity of its inhabitants and to actively promote, attract, encourage and develop recreation, economically sound commerce and industry in the Lakefront Redevelopment Area and to further support the projects previously undertaken in that area; and

WHEREAS, the Agency is desirous of using an amount not to exceed \$21,000 of its Restricted Funds (the "Funding"), to cover the costs associated with the Work from now through December 31, 2020, to be performed by the City of Syracuse Park's Department (the "City"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Agency's procurement policy, because the services are being provided by the City of Syracuse, alternative proposals or quotations are not required; and

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WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York, as amended, and the regulations of the Department of Environmental Conservation of the State of New York promulgated thereunder (collectively referred to hereinafter as "SEQRA"), the Agency is required to make a determination as to whether the "action" (as said quoted term is defined in SEQRA) to be taken by the Agency may have a "significant impact on the environment" (as said quoted term is utilized in SEQRA). The Agency has classified the execution and delivery of the Agreement (as defined herein) and the advancement of the Funding as a "Type II" action as that term is defined under SEQRA, and therefore no further review is required; and

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the members of the City of Syracuse Industrial Development Agency as follows:

Section 1. It is the policy of the State to promote the economic welfare, recreation opportunities and prosperity of its inhabitants and to actively promote, attract, encourage and develop recreation and economically sound commerce and industry for the purpose of preventing unemployment and economic deterioration.

Section 2. It is among the purposes of the Agency to promote, develop, encourage and assist in the acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, improving, maintaining, equipping and furnishing of certain facilities, including commercial facilities, and thereby advance the job opportunities, health, general prosperity and economic welfare of the people of the State and to improve their recreation opportunities, prosperity and standard of living.

Section 3. The Agency hereby makes the following findings and determinations:

- (a) the action authorized pursuant to this Resolution constitutes a Type II action under SEQRA and no further review is required;
- (b) the Agency has the authority to provide the Funding for the performance of the Work and hereby authorizes same provided that the source of the funds necessary to pay for the Work shall be paid solely from the Restricted Funds and provided further that such funds be advanced in accordance with the Agreement (as defined herein) and this Resolution; and
- (c) the Funding is in furtherance of the Agency's corporate purposes and supports projects previously undertaken by the Agency in the area and helps prevent economic deterioration and promote economic development, recreational opportunities and prosperity of the inhabitants of the City and help attract, encourage and develop recreation, economically sound commerce and industry in the Lakefront Redevelopment Area as well as the general prosperity and economic welfare of the people of the City in furtherance of the purposes of the Act.
- Section 4. The (Vice)Chair and or the Executive Director of the Agency are each hereby authorized, on behalf of the Agency, to negotiate, execute and deliver an agreement with the City of Syracuse, NY (the "City") to effectuate the advancement of the Funding in a manner and on terms acceptable to the (Vice)Chair to ensure the timely performance of the Work

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(collectively, the "Agreement"). The execution thereof by the (Vice)Chair and or the Executive Director shall constitute conclusive evidence of such approval.

Section 5. Should any court of competent jurisdiction determine that the Agency is not authorized under the Act to participate in the Agreement, this Resolution shall automatically become null, void and of no further force and effect with respect thereto, and the Agency shall have no liability to the City hereunder or otherwise.

Section 6. No covenant, stipulation, obligation or agreement contained in this Resolution or any other document referred to above shall be deemed to be the covenant, stipulation, obligation or agreement of any member, officer, agent or employee of the Agency in his or her individual capacity. None of the members or officers of the Agency shall be liable or be subject to any personal liability or accountability by reason of the execution of any document referred to above.

Section 7. The Secretary and/or staff of the Agency is hereby authorized and directed to distribute copies of this Resolution and to do such further things or perform such acts as may be necessary or convenient to implement the provisions of this Resolution.

Section 8. A copy of this Resolution shall be placed on file in the office of the Agency where the same shall be available for public inspection during business hours.

RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE SUPPORT OF THE CITY OF SYRACUSE COMMON COUNCIL FOR THE NATIONAL GRASSROOTS INITIATIVE PREVENT NUCLEAR WAR IN ITS CAMPAIGN "BACK FROM THE BRINK: THE CALL TO PREVENT NUCLEAR WAR

WHEREAS, nine (9) nations collectively have approximately 14,500 nuclear weapons in their arsenals, most of which are far more destructive than those that killed hundreds of thousands of people in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Japan, in 1945; and

WHEREAS, the detonation of even a small number of these weapons could have catastrophic human and environmental consequences that could affect everyone on the planet; and

WHEREAS, the United States maintains several hundred nuclear missiles in underground silos on hair-trigger alert, capable of being launched within minutes after a presidential order, which greatly increases the risk of an accidental, mistaken or unauthorized launch; and

WHEREAS, the United States continues to reserve the right to use nuclear weapons first, which reduces the threshold for nuclear use and makes a nuclear war more likely; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has the sole and unchecked authority to order the use of nuclear weapons; and

WHEREAS, over the next thirty (30) years, the United States plans to spend an estimated \$1.7 trillion to replace its entire nuclear arsenal and the bombers, missiles and submarines that deliver them with more capable, more usable versions; and

WHEREAS, taxpayers spend over \$2,000,000.00 every hour of every day to maintain the U.S. nuclear arsenal; and

WHEREAS, a new grassroots movement called "Back from the Brink: The Call to Prevent Nuclear War" has been endorsed by two hundred and fifty (250) health, environmental, academic, peace, faith, and justice organizations and has resulted in resolutions approved by thirty-two (32) municipalities, including the cities of Los Angeles, Baltimore, Salt Lake City, and Washington DC, with more under consideration; and

WHEREAS, the United States, as well as Britain, China, France and Russia, are obligated under the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) to take concrete steps toward eliminating their nuclear arsenals; and

WHEREAS, in July 2017 one hundred and twenty-two (122) nations approved the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons which, upon entry into force, will make it illegal under international law to develop, test, produce, manufacture, or otherwise acquire, possess or stockpile nuclear weapons or other nuclear explosive devices; and

WHEREAS, Prevent Nuclear War is a national grassroots initiative seeking to fundamentally change U.S. Nuclear weapons policy and lead us away from the dangerous path the world is on with respect to this issue and approached the Syracuse Common Council for its support in the campaign "Back from the Brink: The Call to Prevent Nuclear War"; and

WHEREAS, the Syracuse Common Council understands the importance of this issue and wishes to support the "Back from the Brink: The Call to Prevent Nuclear War" campaign;

NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Common Council for the City of Syracuse hereby calls on the United States to lead a global effort to prevent nuclear war by: (1) renouncing the option of using nuclear weapons first; (2) ending the sole, unchecked authority of any president to launch a nuclear attack; (3) taking U.S. nuclear weapons off hair-trigger alert; (4) cancelling the plan to replace its entire arsenal with enhanced weapons; and (5) actively pursuing a verifiable agreement among nuclear-armed states to eliminate their nuclear arsenals.
; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Common Council for the City of Syracuse calls on the United States to embrace the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Clerk is hereby directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to the President of the United States, U.S. Senators Schumer and Gillibrand, U.S. Representative John Katko, and Mayor Benjamin R Walsh.
