We, the duly appointed members of the City Planning Commission of the City of Syracuse, do this 23rd day of November, 2020, adopt the following resolution:

- WHEREAS, the applicant, Daniel Wolnik, is requesting a Special Permit for Light Duty Motor Vehicle Repair on property situated at 1520 West Genesee Street pursuant to Part B, Section III, Article 2 and Part C, Section IV, Articles 1 and 2 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission held a virtual Public Hearing on the request via Webex on November 23, 2020, at 6:00 p.m., heard all those desiring to be heard, and duly recorded their testimony; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission has studied the proposal and all submittals by the applicant and all interested parties; and
- WHEREAS, the subject property is an irregular-shaped, flag lot with approximately 37.68 feet of frontage on West Genesee Street and a lot depth of 183.73 feet; and
- WHEREAS, the property lies within a Business, Class A zoning district, as do the adjacent and neighboring properties to the north, east, and west; neighboring properties to the south lie within an Industrial, Class A zoning district; and
- WHEREAS, land use in the area consists primarily of commercial, retail, and residential uses; and
- WHEREAS, the "Syracuse Land Use and Development Plan" designates the character of this site, which lies within the Westside neighborhood, as Urban Core; and
- WHEREAS, the hours of operation will be from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, and from 8:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, with a maximum of three employees on premises at one time; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant is proposing to install a three-foot by six-foot wall sign on the northeast side of the building in addition to two, two-foot by three-foot, NYS-mandated signs mounted above a mansard roof on the southeast elevation; and
- WHEREAS, the site plan, dated October 5, 2020, illustrates a wood frame building, three billboards (off-premise advertising signs), eight off-street parking spaces, and a dumpster' per the City Transportation Planner, the City has recently completed right-of-way improvements along the West Genesee Street frontage; and
- WHEREAS, the site plan illustrates a 10-foot wide access easement on the adjacent property to the west, known as 1524 West Genesee Street) providing access to North Lowell Avenue; and
- WHEREAS, floor plans dated October 5, 2020, illustrate the first floor with five overhead doors consisting of two overhead doors on the southeast wall and three overhead doors on the northwest wall, four open work areas, two 9'x15' lifts, and an office and customer area; and

- WHEREAS, floor plans illustrate the second floor with an employee area and a bathroom; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal was submitted to the City of Syracuse Departments of Engineering and Public Works, and the Division of City Planning for review; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant submitted a revised site plan and floor plan on November 4, 2020, which addressed review comments and illustrates a 10-foot wide easement to North Lowell Avenue, a dumpster relocated behind the building, and fencing and hedges around the site; and
- WHEREAS, the site plan illustrates three off-premise advertising signs, one single-sided and one double-sided;
 - the Zoning Administrator approved a request to maintain two (single-sided) off-premise advertising signs (AS-74-24) on July 26, 1974;
 - Staff could find no subsequent approval to renew either one or both of the single-sided signs;
 - Staff could find no record of approval for the double-sided sign; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act, the City Planning Commission has reviewed the subject proposal, which is an Unlisted Action and has determined that it will have no significant environmental impact based on the limited magnitude of the proposal, and therefore has issued a negative declaration; and
- WHEREAS, due consideration was given to the necessity, adequacy, and character of the proposed development, and vehicular and pedestrian circulation within the immediate vicinity; and
- WHEREAS, the proposed use is so located as not to be detrimental to adjoining zoning districts and permitted uses; and
- WHEREAS, the proposed use will not create hazardous or obnoxious conditions, and the public health, welfare, and safety will be protected; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal was found to be in character with the adjoining land use;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that We, the duly appointed members of the City Planning Commission of the City of Syracuse, do this 23rd day of November, 2020, APPROVE WITH CONDITION(S) the application of Daniel Wolnik for a Special Permit for Light Duty Motor Vehicle Repair on property situated at 1520 West Genesee Street pursuant to Part B, Section III, Article 2 and Part C, Section IV, Articles 1 and 2 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended;

- 5. Any exterior lighting of the subject proposal shall be designed, located and maintained so as to prevent any direct rays of light from shining beyond the boundaries of the subject property;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this approval is subject to the following **CONDITION(S)**:

• the applicant shall comply with all review comments as established by the City of Syracuse Department of Public Works Transportation Planner;



A RESOLUTION APPROVING IN PART A SPECIAL PERMIT MODIFICATION FOR A RESTAURANT ON PROPERTY SITUATED AT 3930 SOUTH SALINA STREET

We, the duly appointed members of the City Planning Commission of the City of Syracuse, do this 23rd day of November, 2020, adopt the following resolution:

- WHEREAS, the applicant, Ray Trotta-The Holland Trotta Project, is requesting to modify the site plan, floor plan, elevations, and signage for a Special Permit for a Restaurant in order to facilitate interior, exterior, and site alterations to an existing (Burger King) Restaurant on property situated at 3930 South Salina Street pursuant to Part B, Section III, Article 2 and Part C, Section IV, Articles 1 and 2 of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission held a virtual Public Hearing on the request via Webex on November 23, 2020, at 6:00 p.m., heard all those desiring to be heard, and duly recorded their testimony; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission has studied the proposal and all submittals by the applicant and all interested parties; and
- WHEREAS, the scope of work includes interior and exterior renovations to the existing building and site alterations to include installing a double-lane drive-through; and
- WHEREAS, the subject property is irregular in shape with approximately 40 feet of frontage on Ballantyne Road and 160.29 feet of frontage on South Salina Street; and
- WHEREAS, the property lies within a Business, Class A zoning district, as do adjacent and neighboring properties to the south and east; adjacent properties to the north lie within a Planned Shopping District zoning district; adjacent properties to the west lie within a Residential, Class B zoning district; neighboring properties to the north, south, east, and west lie within a Residential, Class A-1 zoning district; and
- WHEREAS, land use in the area consists primarily of residential uses with a mix of residential, commercial, retail, and office uses along South Salina Street; and
- WHEREAS, the "Syracuse Land Use and Development Plan" designates the character of this site, which lies within the Valley neighborhood, as Suburban Commercial; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission approved a Special Permit for a Package Food Restaurant (SP-86-13) on May 28, 1986, granting a waiver from the sign regulations; and
- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission approved a Change of Zone (Z-2351) on September 3, 1986, for property situated at 137 Ballantyne Road from Residential, Class B to Business, Class A, which was a companion application to a Special Permit application (SP-86-35); and

- WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission approved a substantial modification to a Special Permit for a Package Food Restaurant (SP-86-35) to modify the site plan to establish an access driveway at 137 Ballantyne Road; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant is not proposing any changes to the hours of operation, which were originally approved to be Sunday through Thursday from 6:30 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. and Friday and Saturday from 6:30 a.m. until 1:00 a.m.; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant is not proposing any changes to the maximum number of employees on premises at one time, which was originally approved to be twelve; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal was submitted to the City of Syracuse Departments of Engineering and Public Works, and the Division of City Planning for review; received comments were provided to the applicant on or about November 13, 2020; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant submitted a revised site plan on November 17, 2020, in response to City and Staff review comments; and
- WHEREAS, the overall site plan (Sheet 5 of 5) dated July 27, 2020, with a latest revision date of September 2, 2020, illustrates an existing (Burger King) building with a dumpster enclosure adjacent to the building, a proposed, double-lane drive-through with signage, an existing ground sign, two driveways on South Salina Street, one driveway on Ballantyne Road, and 62 off-street parking spaces; and
- WHEREAS, the floor plans (Sheet A-100 dated August 6, 2020, and Sheet I-1a dated March 23, 2020 and last revised on March 31, 2020) illustrate a dining room with approximately 990 square feet of customer area and seating for approximately 50 patrons; and
- WHEREAS, the elevations (Sheets A-200A dated August 10, 2017, and A-200B dated April 21, 2017) illustrate finishing materials as identified on SheetA-202 dated April 21, 2017, as well as the location and dimensions for proposed signage; and
- WHEREAS, the applicant is proposing to install seven wall signs and five ground signs totaling 240.8 square feet; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part C, Section IV, Article 2-8.1, paragraph d.(5)(c) of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that curbs shall be provided along the edge of all areas accessible to motor vehicles to prevent the encroachment of vehicles or any portions thereof, upon adjacent property or the street right-of-way; the site plan does not illustrate the required curbing around the entire parking lot; and
- WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part C, Section IV, Article 2-8.1, paragraph d.(6) of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that Special Permit Uses are allowed one wall and one ground sign, neither to exceed 40 square feet; the applicant is proposing to install seven wall signs and five ground signs totaling 240.8 square feet; and

WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part C, Section IV, Article 2-8.1, paragraph d.(9) of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that restaurants shall provide solid, all-year screening at least four feet high along the perimeters of the parking areas abutting residentially used or zoned properties; the property abuts property to the west that lies within a Residential, Class B zoning district and the site plan does not illustrate the required screening along the entire length of the west side of the parking lot; and

WHEREAS, the proposal deviates from Part C, Section IV, Article 2-8.1, paragraph e.(1) of the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, in that no restaurant with provisions for drive-through windows shall be placed within 200 feet of any residentially zoned district or building used for residential purposes; although the City Planning Commission waived this requirement as part of SP-86-13, the applicant is requesting to install a second drive-through lane; and

WHEREAS, the proposal necessitates four waivers from the City of Syracuse Zoning Rules and Regulations, as amended, with respect to the curbing, sign, screening, and drive-through location regulations; and

WHEREAS, New Visions Communications, Inc. has requested a revocable permission to construct, own, operate and maintain an underground 1 ¼ " diameter conduit and series of handholes containing a fiber optic system in the Solar Street, West Court Street and North Clinton Street Right of Ways. The length of conduit to be installed is 2,300 linear feet approximately, starting just northerly of the Solar St. and West Clinton S. intersection, behind the northerly Solar St sidewalk, turning then onto West Court St., turning then onto North Clinton St, terminating at the Bear St. intersection; the conduit at all times remains in the grass lawn area. The alignment and route of the fiber optic conduit in the City's Solar Street, West Court Street and North Clinton Street Right-of-Ways is detailed on plans developed by Rambolli dated 11/19/20 which are based on a topographic survey prepared by C.T. Male entitled "Topographic and Boundary Survey Lands now or Formerly of Destiny USA Land Company, LLC, Dembo Development Associates, Inc., Lansing Group Inc., Emerald Point, Inc., Sunnydale Corporation, and JPD Corp."

; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Engineering has reviewed, coordinated with other City departments and is of the opinion that the installation of the facilities described in the plans and

specifications on file at the Department of Engineering, will not interfere with the public use of the streets; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, upon the recommendation of the Department of Engineering that this Common Council hereby grants permission to New Visions Communications, Inc. to construct, to own, operate and maintain an underground 1 ¼ " diameter conduit and series of handholes containing a fiber optic system in the Solar Street, West Court Street and North Clinton Street Right of Ways. The length of conduit to be installed is 2,300 linear feet approximately, starting just northerly of the Solar St. and West Clinton S. intersection, behind the northerly Solar St sidewalk, turning then onto West Court St., turning then onto North Clinton St, terminating at the Bear St. intersection; the conduit at all times remains in the grass lawn area. The alignment and route of the fiber optic conduit in the City's Solar Street, West Court Street and North Clinton Street Right-of-Ways is approved as as shown on the drawings and specifications as forwarded to the Department of Engineering developed by Rambolli dated November 19, 2020 which are based on a topographic survey prepared by C.T. Male entitled "Topographic and Boundary Survey Lands now or Formerly of Destiny USA Land Company, LLC, Dembo Development Associates, Inc., Lansing Group Inc., Emerald Point, Inc., Sunnydale Corporation, and JPD Corp."; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the revocable permission for the conduit, handholes and fiber optic installations will be subject to the following as permitted by law:

- 1. The Owner shall construct, without cost to the City, and in accordance with plans, specifications and final locations to be approved by the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the Commissioner of Water, the conduit and appurtenances (the "Work") which are the subjects of this action.
- 2. The plans and specifications required to construct all facilities subject to this ordinance shall be prepared by a Professional Engineer registered by the State of New York. The plans for the work shall be approved by the City Engineer, and record drawings, including AutoCAD and GIS formats on magnetic media referenced to New York State plane coordinate, Central Zone shall be provided to the City Engineer subsequent to the

completion of the work. New Visions Communications, Inc. is to provide a certification by a Professional Engineer as to the accuracy of the as-built drawings and attest to the fact that the improvements were constructed in conformity with the plans and specifications approved by the City. As-built drawings and a certification of completion shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the Department of Public Works has determined that the project is complete. If this information is not received, you will be subject to a \$500.00 penalty fee and additional collection fees if necessary.

- 3. That traffic shall be maintained at all times during construction. The entire excavation of said work is to be protected by suitable guards and signal both by day and night and precautions are to be taken by all reasonable means to prevent any accident or injury while the work is in progress.
- 4. That New Visions Communications, Inc. their successors, assigns, and agents shall at all times defend and indemnify and save harmless the City of Syracuse, its officers and servants from any and all liability and from any and all claims, damages, costs and expenses of every name and nature to person or property which may accrue or grow out of the installation, operation, and maintenance of such utility lines in said streets or arising in any way out of the operations for this consent, and shall defend and indemnify and save harmless said City from all costs, damages and expenses by reason of any damages or injuries to any gas pipe, water pipe, sewers, other utilities, pipes or construction work now located in, under and along the surface of said street at the point and place or places where said work is to be performed and maintained, including damages incurred as a result of damage to the Facilities caused by the City.
- 5. That said applicant, its successors or assigns, shall within thirty (30) days from the adoption of this Ordinance execute and file in the Office of the City Clerk written acceptance of this permission and consent.
- 6. That all ordinances, rules and regulations of the City and its departments shall at all time be complied with including the Building Code of the City of Syracuse.
- 7. The Work shall be subject to street cut and repair permitting process administered by the Commissioner of Public Works and any other standard permitting processes that exist. Restoration of pavement, sidewalks & other surfaces shall be in accordance with all City of Syracuse standards. If the alignment/route of the conduit needs to change during construction as a result of unforeseen conditions or obstructions, the City shall first be consulted and shall approve any change in alignment/direction before proceeding further. Any conduit installed in the pavement section or under the sidewalk shall be encased in concrete.
- 8. That the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioner of Water shall be advised in advance of time when the work is to be done and the work of installation, including shoring, protection of pipes and facilities and other safety measures, shall be subject to the supervision of the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioner of Water.

- 9. Subject to the City Engineer's review and approval, permission may be granted by the City for other utilities to cross the area to be occupied by the proposed facilities.
- 10. All work shall be done in a skillful manner with reasonable dispatch and in accordance with plans and specifications and all conditions imposed by any laws, rules or regulations which may apply to the work. A dust and sediment and erosion control program shall be in effect for the duration of the project to prevent a nuisance and to prevent interference with or damage to adjacent property, streets, sewers and drainage courses.
- 11. That New Visions Communications, Inc. shall adequately and properly protect any existing underground utilities located within or near said installation. If any such property or facilities are interfered with or damaged, New Visions Communications, Inc., or its successors and assigns, shall be responsible for replacement to the satisfaction of the City Engineer. Should the City Engineer determine that City facilities or utilities require relocation, temporary support or other modification as a result of this Work, said modifications shall be made as directed by the City Engineer.
- 12. That New Visions Communications, Inc., its successors, assigns, and agents shall, upon request by the City, permit the construction, installation, repair, replacement and removal of any and all utilities necessary at any time in the future to be located or placed within said lines and appurtenances; and New Visions Communications, Inc., shall agree to assume any excess of the normal cost of installation of such utilities occasioned by the existence of said lines and appurtenances in said streets.
- 13. That New Visions Communications, Inc., its successors, assigns, and agents shall obtain and keep in force for the duration of this permission, a general liability insurance policy, in the amount of \$2,000,000, naming the City of Syracuse as an additional insured. Request for Legislation: A revocable permission to New Visions Communications, Inc. to construct, own, operate and maintain an underground 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " diameter conduit and series of handholes containing a fiber optic system in the Solar Street, West Court Street and North Clinton Street Right of Ways.

Dear Mr. Copanas:

I request that the following legislation for the next meeting of the Common Council be prepared:

A revocable permission to New Visions Communications, Inc. to construct, own, operate and maintain an underground 1 ¼ " diameter conduit and series of handholes containing a fiber optic system in the Solar Street, West Court Street and North Clinton Street Right of Ways. The length of conduit to be installed is 2,300 linear feet approximately, starting just northerly of the Solar St. and West Clinton S. intersection, behind the northerly Solar St sidewalk, turning then onto West Court St., turning then onto North Clinton St, terminating at the Bear St. intersection; the conduit at all times remains in the grass lawn area. The alignment and route of the fiber optic conduit in the City's Solar Street, West Court Street and North Clinton Street Right-of-Ways is detailed on plans developed by Rambolli dated 11/19/20 which are based on a topographic survey prepared by C.T. Male entitled "Topographic and Boundary Survey Lands now or Formerly of Destiny USA Land Company, LLC, Dembo Development Associates, Inc., Lansing Group Inc., Emerald Point, Inc., Sunnydale Corporation, and JPD Corp.".

This department has reviewed, coordinated with other City departments and is of the opinion that the installation of the facilities described in the plans on file at our office will not interfere with the public use of the streets. It is, therefore, recommended that an ordinance be submitted for consideration by the Common Council permitting New Visions Communications, Inc. to construct, operate, and maintain the above described fiber optic conduit and handholes in the aforementioned R.O.W's as shown on the drawings as forwarded to the Department of Engineering.

The revocable permission for the conduit, handholes and fiber optic installations will be subject to the following as permitted by law:

- 1. The Owner shall construct, without cost to the City, and in accordance with plans, specifications and final locations to be approved by the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the Commissioner of Water, the conduit and appurtenances (the "Work") which are the subjects of this action.
- 2. The plans and specifications required to construct all facilities subject to this ordinance shall be prepared by a Professional Engineer registered by the State of New York. The plans for the work shall be approved by the City Engineer, and record drawings, including AutoCAD and GIS formats on magnetic media referenced to New York State plane coordinate, Central Zone shall be provided to the City Engineer subsequent to the completion of the work. New Visions Communications, Inc. is to provide a certification by a Professional Engineer as to the accuracy of the as-built drawings and attest to the fact that the improvements were constructed in conformity with the plans and specifications approved by the City. As-built drawings and a certification of completion shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the Department of Public Works has determined that the project is complete. If this information is not received, you will be subject to a \$500.00 penalty fee and additional collection fees if necessary.
- 3. That traffic shall be maintained at all times during construction. The entire excavation of said work is to be protected by suitable guards and signal both by day and night and precautions are to be taken by all reasonable means to prevent any accident or injury while the work is in progress.
- 4. That New Visions Communications, Inc. their successors, assigns, and agents shall at all times defend and indemnify and save harmless the City of Syracuse, its officers and servants from any and all liability and from any and all claims, damages, costs and expenses of every name and nature to person or property which may accrue or grow out of the installation, operation, and maintenance of such utility lines in said streets or arising in any way out of the operations for this consent, and shall defend and indemnify and save harmless said City from all costs, damages and expenses by reason of any damages or injuries to any gas pipe, water pipe, sewers, other utilities, pipes or construction work now located in, under and along the surface of said street at the point and place or places where said work is to be performed and maintained, including damages incurred as a result of damage to the Facilities caused by the City.
- 5. That said applicant, its successors or assigns, shall within thirty (30) days from the adoption of this Ordinance execute and file in the Office of the City Clerk written acceptance of this permission and consent.
- 6. That all ordinances, rules and regulations of the City and its departments shall at all time be complied with including the Building Code of the City of Syracuse.
- 7. The Work shall be subject to street cut and repair permitting process administered by the Commissioner of Public Works and any other standard permitting processes that exist. Restoration of pavement, sidewalks & other surfaces shall be in accordance with all City of Syracuse standards. If the alignment/route of the conduit needs to change during construction as a result of unforeseen

conditions or obstructions, the City shall first be consulted and shall approve any change in alignment/direction before proceeding further. Any conduit installed in the pavement section or under the sidewalk shall be encased in concrete.

- 8. That the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioner of Water shall be advised in advance of time when the work is to be done and the work of installation, including shoring, protection of pipes and facilities and other safety measures, shall be subject to the supervision of the City Engineer, the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioner of Water.
- 9. Subject to the City Engineer's review and approval, permission may be granted by the City for other utilities to cross the area to be occupied by the proposed facilities.
- 10. If any such property or facilities are interfered with or damaged, New Visions Communications, Inc., or its successors and assigns, shall be responsible for replacement to the satisfaction of the City Engineer. Should the City Engineer determine that City facilities or utilities require relocation, temporary support or other modification as a result of this Work, said modifications shall be made as directed by the City Engineer.
